New Rules for Required Burning Permits

By the time this article comes out winter will be over and spring will be here, I for one will not miss shoveling snow. For the months of January and February your Fire Dept. has responded to the following: 1 investigation for an electrical issue, 1 vehicle fire, 1 structure fire - minor, 1 motor vehicle accident, 2 alarm activated, 2 CO detector alarms, and 12 medical assists. This brings our total so far for 2011 to 20 calls. As you can see medical assists still make up the majority of our calls.

First I would like to congratulate the Beaver Bank Community Awareness Association on publishing their 100th issue of the Beaver Bank Kinsac Bulletin. Our community is a much better place to live because of the dedication and hard work from volunteers like the ones with the BBCAA.

With the arrival of spring it also means people are going to want to get back outside and burn the brush laying around their property. I just want to remind people that the safest time to burn brush is in the winter or early spring when the woods are wet. I also want to remind everyone that on October 23, 2010 the burning by-law was changed. I suggest anyone who wants to burn brush on their property go to the Halifax.ca web site and follow the links to Fire & Emergency, click on Fire Prevention and you will find the "Open Air Burning" section. You should read the "Open Air Burning By-Law O-109", "Administrative Order Number 33" and "Can I Burn in HRM?" This will give you information regarding the difference between the "Permit Required Zone" and the "No Permit Required Zone". On this web site you will also be able to find information on how you can contact the Fire Prevention division of HRM Fire & Emergency.

If you live in the "No Permit Required Zone" you will still require a DNR burning permit from April 15th to October 15th, which you can obtain at the fire station Tuesday evenings between 7 and 8 pm. If you have any fire related inquiries and you cannot make it into the station on Tuesday nights you can leave us a message at 865-8996 and we will call you back.

Community Policing Office Still Open at HTB

The Beaver Bank Community Policing Office Volunteers would like to congratulate the BBCAA for their 100th issue of the Beaver Bank Bulletin.

In February 1995 Inspector Carlson, Officer in Charge of the RCMP Lower Sackville Detachment approached Cst. John Bickerton with a proposal to create one of the first Community Policing offices in Nova Scotia. Beaver Bank was an ideal location to create this community project. In conjunction with the Beaver Bank Community Awareness

Association, the County Councillor, Beaver Bank Kinsac Volunteer Fire Department and with other community support, a location and initial funding was obtained and the foundation for the development of the office was formulated.

Cst. Bickerton approached the community seeking local volunteers to operate the office. Sixty-four individuals applied and all were screened and security cleared. The Beaver Bank Com munityPolicingOfficewas constructed in October 1995 and the Grand Opening was held November 4, 1995. In September 1998 the volunteers applied for and were granted a Certificate of Incorporation under the Societies Act of Nova Scotia making it the first Community Policing Association in the Province.

Over the years there have been many

Bursary For Health Related Studies

The Cobequid Community Health Board is offering a \$1000 Bursary towards tuition to a Grade 12 student who is enrolled in a post-secondary program (university or college) related to the medical field. One bursary each will be granted to a student at Lockview, CP Allen, Sackville High and Millwood. The deadline is May 12th, 2011, at which time the applicant must have submitted the completed application form along with the irtranscript, t wo letters of recommendation (one personal, one academic), an essay and a letter of acceptance from a health education program. Preference will be given to the

following programs: medical laboratory technologist, x -ra y technologist, physiotherapy assistant, pharmacy clerk, EKG technologist and orthopaedic technician.

There is also a second single \$1000 Tuition Bursary to be awarded to a student who will be attending a health related program (same preference as above). The applicant must be involved in the Cobequid Community area, have previously attended one of the high schools above, be involved with a Cobequid community sports association or a not her relevant community. Otherwise the application requirements are the same as above.

We are also very excited to announce that a multi-sport asphalt pad will be constructed on the rink site this spring. This will serve as a wonderful location for Beaver Bank citizens to come and participate in physical fitness activities. The construction project has a price tag of approximately \$70,000. Funding for this construction (including the purchase of equipment) will be coming from a variety of agencies including: The HTB Junior High PTA, HRM Councillor Barry Dalrymple,



RCMP Policing Efforts

With spring now arriving I have been meeting with the RCMP regularly to help ensure we all have a safe and enjoyable summer, there is a lot of recent police



activity you should know about:

- First I would like to thank Cst Tamu Bracken and all of our Elementary School Staff as she taught and graduated 6 classes recently from four different area schools on the RCMP DARE Program (Drug Education) - well done students.
- I would also like to thank the RCMP for being in the right place at the right time when they were on patrol in the Fall River Sobeys Mall and noticed an armed robbery in progress at the pizza store. They were able to intervene and stop this and were able to arrest one subject and recover a weapon, thanks for being there.
- I also applaud the increased radar patrols on the # 2 hwy in Wellington and the checkpoints throughout our District lately, please keep it up.
- With snow melting I can already see the increase in speeding in our subdivisions and on our residential streets. Come on people, this is where our kids & families are out walking, jogging and biking S L O W D O W N b e f o r e yo u r u i n someone's life. My meetings with the police will continue to push for more radar and more checkpoints until we all get the message.
- We have also been talking about boat safety and the need for much more visibility on our lakes, the local Detachment has already put requests in for many more hours of having the RCMP boats here this Summer on our lakes, I am advising you in advance they will be here at my request be safe, be compliant!

Many Minor Sports groups have spring registration dates coming up very

soon. LWF Baseball, Soccer and Cheema are all registering now while Minor Football has their AGM upcoming. For dates/info go to my website as listed above, our District has first class sports and rec groups so get your kids involved and participating.

There are a number of events/items that are ongoing, which are big issues for our District, some updates are:

- 1) Beaver Bank Kinsac Community Centre - As you all know by now the Centre that burnt down had already been outgrown by the community. Originally paid for completely by a community Area Rate for \$3 million, the community now deserves and needs a larger centre, which includes HRM's goals of being accessible and environmentally friendly. This new building will be bigger and better, be more accessible to all and will contain a sprinkler system and air conditioning but the price of the new building is now \$8 million. Our HRM Dept's that have been working on this are recommending HRM put in close to \$4 million from its General Tax Rate and that recommendation is included in the upcoming April budget plans. I am hopeful that with full support of our Dept's that HRM Council will support this item in the budget, if it is passed, everything else (design work etc) is complete and we will go to tender as soon as budget gets final approval.
- 2) Beaver Bank Brown Hall if you've driven by recently you would have noticed that there has been tremendous work done and the Hall is very close to being finished and re-opened, fantastic work by the volunteers and people and it will be such a relief to get one community hall back up and operating.

3) Fall River/Airport Transit - this has been in the news a lot lately and as many know by now the new MetroX route from Dartmouth to Fall River to Airport and back has been planned to open in May of next year (2012). HRM recently agreed to put another \$3 million into the building of the new Bus terminal in Dartmouth and I fully supported that decision, as that will be the main connector to this Fall River/ Airport route. By doing that though HRM needs to find the extra \$3 million and there are decisions that need to be made very soon to find those funds. One of those possibilities is that the MetroX route could be delayed a year but the Airport Authority Board wrote the HRM last week that it was willing to increase its offer of a subsidy to \$500,000 if the route

is completed to the Airport next year as planned. We will have a decision on this by the time of my next article to you and I will advise you accordingly.

- 5) Beaver Bank Transit there is no change in this status. Months ago, after me e tings withourlocalTransit

 Committee we gave a modified proposal to our Transit Dept and to Council. Along with the other rural transit routes these proposals are being studied and costed and many questions are being answered. When this is all done a report and hopefully a favourable recommendation will come back to Council for a decision.
- 6) Waverley Baseball Field what a great sight, I walked in last night (Mar 19th) and the entire area is cleared and heavy excavators have been at work removing two hills and are filling in and levelling the field area. To date they are not encountering any rock or slate, which is also good news. The gate to the park will

remain locked while construction is underway but feel free to walk in and have a look.

HRM Public Works has sent out its prebudget list of re-paving and micro filling for this summer, on that list for District 2 are:

- Hwy 2 from Collins Drive to Sunnylea Road
- Windgate Road from Beaver Bank Road to # 1992
- Aerotech Drive at the Airport
 Lakeview Road from Cobequid Road to civic #46

More projects will come with the final budget approval.

My last note is that every spring brings the potholes, washouts and knocked down signs. We cannot fix them if we do not know about them especially in the subdivisions. I ask and encourage residents to jot down civic addresses where you see these and report them ASAP to our HRM Service Centre at 490- 4000. This number is staffed 7 days a week from 7 am to 11 pm and operators will be pleased to take your report, issue you a service number and report the item directly to our Dept responsible to fix it. To our many residents who live on gravel roads, while the graders cannot work on them while they are still wet I do ask that you call in the request for necessary work and grading now so that they are on the list to be done as soon as weather permits. If some people on your street are interested in meeting and talking about having your road paved feel free to call me and we can set up a meeting to discuss real policies, costs and procedures.

I think we are all glad to see that spring is in the air, warmest regards.






Spring is Harvest Time for Collection Agencies

This is the time of year when my office receives a lot of calls from distraught and fearful people who are being contacted by collection agencies. If you owe a debt and the lender hasn't been able to get you to pay, they can choose to sell the debt to a collector. The collector takes a risk buying these debts because collectors only make their money if they can get you to pay. And that commission payment system is what makes collection agencies staff so aggressive.

If you are being contacted by a collection agency there are a few things that you should know. There are laws governing collection agencies and limit what they do as they try to get the debt paid. If you find a collector is doing any of the following, please contact me or contact the office of Consumer Protection directly.

Collectors cannot provide false or misleading information to you. My office has recently had complaints of collectors using legal terminology in conversation to give the impression that the agency is about to sue if you don't pay. Be mindful if collectors use the terms "Draft Statement of Claim," "legal action," "court,' or "our lawyers." They may be trying to trick you into thinking that you are in more trouble than you really are.





Collectors cannot disclose the existence of a debt to anyone other than the debtor him or herself. Collectors are not allowed to phone family, friends, co-workers or employers and reveal to them that you have a debt in collections. The most they can do is ask others for your mailing address, so if you make sure that they have your current address there is no reason for them to call anyone else.

Collectors cannot phone you until after they have notified you in writing that the debt is now with their agency. And then if you don't want them to phone anymore, you have the right to tell them to contact you in writing only. It is often advisable to insist on written communication: it will allow you some time to prepare your response, and it keeps a clear record of everything you have said to them.

Collectors are allowed to make payment arrangements that allow you to repay the debt over a reasonable time. If you are having trouble getting a collector to agree to paying in instalments, give my office a call. We may be able to give you advice specific to you situation.

If you're not sure what to do, the provincial office of Consumer Protection can be reached by call Service Nova Scotia 424 5200. Still not sure what to do, contact my office and we'll walk you through it. Call 860-4004 to talk or to book an appointment.


