The Beaver Bank Kinsac Volunteer Fire Station celebrated its grand opening on Saturday May 25th.

The station had been destroyed by fire late in the night in September 2009. All that remained were the bays which housed the fire trucks. Firefighters' training records had been lost. The Community Center was also destroyed. It was a devastating and shocking incident for the residents of Beaver Bank.

The grand opening gave residents a chance to visit the new facilities and meet the firefighters.

Following opening remarks by Beaver Bank Fire Chief Tim Keddy, Halifax Fire Chief Doug Trussler and Deputy Fire Chief Brian Gray, a ribbon-cutting ceremony and official cake cutting was held to mark the event.

Snacks and refreshments were served, the fire trucks were on display, and the fire department's mascot "Sparky the dog" was on hand for the kids.

Station 48 consists of 3 fire trucks and currently has 24 trained volunteer firefighters. They are always looking for new volunteers. If interested, you may contact the fire department for more information and to obtain an application form.

Brian Wong - A Political Journey...on a Segway?



In June of last year Brian Wong decided to run for MLA for Waverley Fall River Beaver Bank as a member of Jamie Baillie's P.C. team. As an educator and high school principal, he was deeply concerned about the state of education in Nova Scotia today. Brian is becoming more educated every day—about community, about government and about

politics. In addition to knowing firsthand the problems in our education system, Brian is now experiencing firsthand the deficiencies in our health care system. Right now, he is in need of a double hip replacement, the result of a lifetime of competitive sports and athletic activity. He's been in chronic pain for quite some time. He had to wait 6 months just to see a specialist. When he received the doctor's diagnosis he learned that the waitlist for the necessary operation is eighteen months. Although Brian realizes that he is much better off than many others waiting for health care services, he is frustrated because he cannot be as productive as he wants to be and it affects his quality of life in general.

One of the main requirements of a political candidate is to canvass door to door to meet as many voters as possible—but this hip problem is interfering mightily with that need. That's why Brian is using a Segway to enable him to go from door to door in our communities. It's an

environmentally friendly and innovative way that allows him to be more independent and productive. It still isn't pain free, but it makes the canvassing job doable. And Brian is dedicated to doing it.

Brian is learning a lot as he listens to folks in our Waverley-Fall River-Beaver Bank Communities—and he's quickly learning that as Jamie Baillie says, we really need to change direction in Nova Scotiaindeed-we need a total renovation of our provincial government. It's not just education and health that are in trouble - it's the way things are being done across the board. Brian knows he can help Jamie Baillie in meeting this need. So when you see or hear of him on the Segway, please remember why he's using it.

Injured Soldier must be Reinstated

I have called on the federal government to reinstate Cpl. Glen Kirkland, the injured soldier who recently spoke out about the difficulties he faced in receiving care. Cpl. Kirkland served in Afghanistan and suffered injuries including hearing loss, vision problems, PTSD, and a brain injury. In June, he testified at the Standing Committee on National Defence about his difficulty in receiving benefits and proper care from Veterans Affairs Canada and the Department of National Defence. He has told DND that he wishes to continue serving until September 2015.

A week after his testimony to the Parliamentary Committee, Cpl. Kirkland was told that he would be discharged in six months. This was days after Defence Minister MacKay gave his word to Parliament that he would 'suffer nc consequences' for his testimony.

Cpl. Glen Kirkland is a brave young man. Minister MacKay gave his assurances that this injured soldier and his family would 'suffer no ramifications for his testimony' and 'will continue to serve as long as he decides to serve in the Canadian Armed Forces.' I have asked the government to reverse the orders for early discharge. At the time this article was written. I am hopeful that this issue has been resolved and that Cpl. Kirkland will no longer be discharged early. I have also asked the federal government to apologize to Cpl. Kirkland for this situation.

Stop fees for Paper Billing
In my recent newsletter, I talked
about the extra fees companies are

charging customers to receive a monthly bill in the mail. Many telephone, internet, TV and other companies have now introduced new monthly charges to customers who continue to receive a paper copy of their monthly bill in the mail.

Companies must stop charging these extra fees simply for the privilege of receiving a paper bill in the mail. The practice unfairly targets Canadian seniors and families already struggling to pay their bills, as well as those who do not have regular access to the internet or do not feel comfortable performing such transactions online.

My colleague Andrew Cash has launched a campaign to eliminate extra charges for receiving a monthly bill in the mail. Cash is calling on the federal government to prohibit these so called 'Pay-to-Pay' fees. As Cash points out, some companies claim this is an attempt to reduce paper but "if they were serious about going

green, they would have offered a discount for customers that use online billing rather than penalize those who can't easily make the transition."

A growing number of companies have indicated they are adding these charges even though they have already raked in huge savings from those customers who have voluntarily switched to online billing. "This is a clear cash-grab worth millions of dollars, and Canadian seniors are largely the ones being stuck with the bill," said Cash.

Spring Session of the Legislature-Building a better future for Nova Scotia families

We recently finished up the spring session at Nova Scotia Legislature. The session saw many pieces of legislation pass that will help build a better future for Nova Scotia families.

One of the most important steps our government took this session was to protect cuts to the HST on home energy and other essentials, ensuring families will never have to pay more for the things they need. Any future government who wants to put the provincial portion of the HST back on home energy and other essential items will now have to ask Nova Scotians first. Changes to the Financial Measures (2013) Act will require a provincial referendum, and the approval of the majority of Nova Scotians, before the HST can be added back to family essentials including home energy, children's diapers, children's clothing, children's footwear, books, feminine hygiene products, and first-time home purchases.

In this session we also introduced a balanced budget, making Nova Scotia one of only four provinces to balance a provincial budget this year. The budget included funding to help people with diabetes purchase insulin pumps and supplies(for children under 18), expanded dental care coverage for 40,000 more young Nova Scotians, as well as, expanded newborn screening to include sickle cell, cystic fibrosis, and eight additional conditions. Previously, babies born in Nova Scotia were only screened for 13 conditions.

The budget also announced funding to establish "early years" centres at schools, giving parents access to a more coordinated approach to programs and services. We also added an additional assessment when children reach 36 months to

identify needs and ensure supports are in place when the child starts school. Before, children were only assessed at 18 months.

In addition to the budget, a number of other legislative items were introduced including Nova Scotia's first long term housing strategy which will help thousands of Nova Scotians gain access to safe, affordable housing. This will provide many more Nova Scotians an opportunity to own their own home. Nova Scotians waited a long time for a better approach to housing and I'm pleased that we now have a strategy to start moving forward.

Recent changes to the House of Assembly Act were passed through the Legislature this past sitting. These changes put the recommendations of the Electoral Boundary Commission into place and subsequently slightly changed the electoral boundaries of Waverlev -Fall River - Beaver Bank. As a little background, legislation requires electoral boundaries in Nova Scotia be reviewed every 10 years following the Census to ensure current population levels best represent the size of the riding. In 2011, the Electoral Boundaries Commission was appointed by an allparty committee of the Legislature and carried out two rounds of public hearings throughout the province in 2012. Specific to the riding of Waverley-Fall River-Beaver Bank, our current boundaries will change and as such, two small portions will exist in different ridings come the next election. In Beaver Bank we will see the Woodbine land lease community and the Monarch-Rivendale community become part of the new constituency of Sackville-Beaver Bank. The changes to our constituency boundaries will only

come into effect once an election is called in Nova Scotia. Until such time, I will remain your Member of the Legislative Assembly and continue to work hard for you and your families. It remains a pleasure and privilege to serve as your MLA.

I want to acknowledge an unfortunate encounter I had with a member of the Liberal Caucus at the Nova Scotia Legislature recently. I lost my cool for a few seconds and for which I sincerely apologize. I am an emotional person but I have always prided myself in being able to maintain my composure, a value my parents instilled in me. Following the incident I made the decision to step down from my position as Minister of Economic and Rural Development and Tourism and African Nova Scotian Affairs. Despite this decision, I remain committed to serving the people of Waverley, Fall River, and Beaver Bank as their MLA and will be re-offering in the next election. I want to thank those of you who have reached out to me recently. Your support means a lot to me and my family. I certainly cannot express in words how much I value the support so many of you have demonstrated in recent weeks. Your cards, letters, emails and telephone calls will be treasured for a lifetime.

I would like to take the time to recognize the hard work of Kathy Fougere and her group of dedicated volunteers from the Woodbine Family Association. Many seniors and their friends were treated to a delicious lunch and dessert each Tuesday at the Brown Hall. I wish Kathy well in enjoying a relaxing summer break. I look forward to seeing everybody again in September.



By-Pass Update

We are addressing the Beaver Bank Bypass again. For those of you who are not aware, for years the Association has been lobbying for an extra road into Beaver Bank. The first part was built a couple of years ago, Margeson Drive, off of the 101, but we are stalled at the moment acquiring land. HRM works with landowners to develop their properties and share the cost of the roads involved. HRM is hesitant to expropriate the properties because of the cost and requires cooperation between developers and landowners. This is where we are.

On behalf of the association, Councillor Brad Johns plans to meet with the major land owners in the area to see if we can get movement on this issue.

Met with planners yesterday and emphasized with them our goal in the near future is to change, in the HRM plan, the designation of the bypass from "Future Potential" to "Future Development".

The Burnside bypass is planned to be opened in 2 years. This road will come through Duke St, onto Glendale which ends on the Beaver Bank road. They don't believe there will be any impact on this end as commuters can exit onto the 102 or Cobequid Rd on the way through.

We will monitor that and hope they are correct. In the meantime we plan in future issues to show you how to navigate through Subdivisions if there are issues on the main road.

Also we have two developers in the area who are willing to give us beach access in exchange for permission from HRM to build their proposed Subdivisions.

This is in HRM's hands at the moment and the association is aggressively pursuing the beach that we desperately need.
