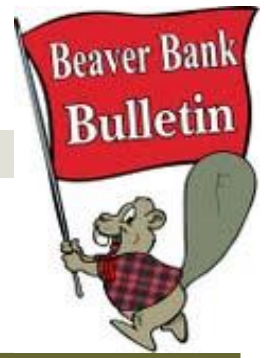

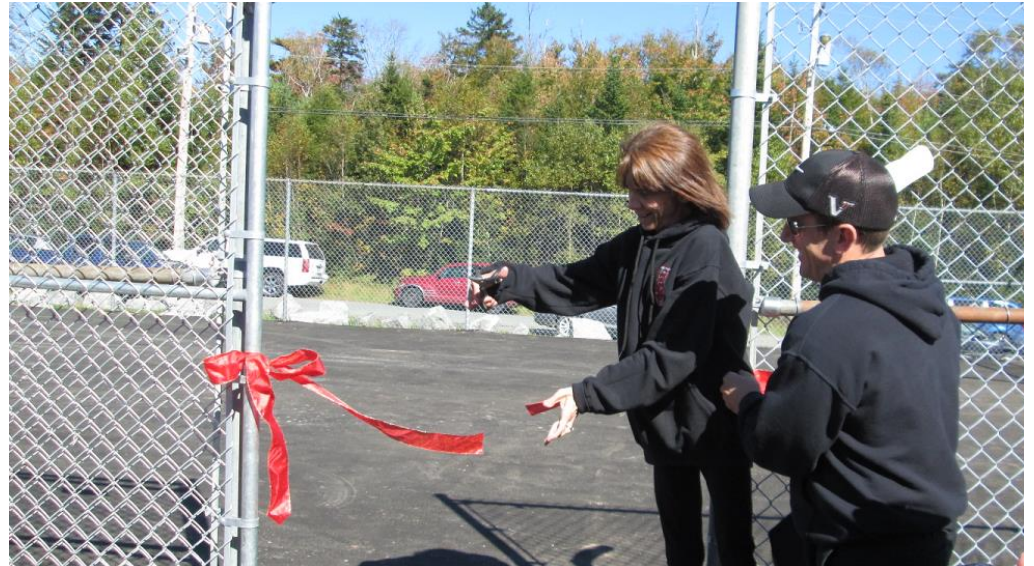

## Bonnie Ryan Sports Pad Grand Opening

After much hard work and planning the Bonnie Ryan Sports Pad was officially opened at Harold T. Barrett Junior High School on October 5<sup>th</sup>. It was a beautiful fall day just perfect for the well-attended event. Concession stands were set up with hot dogs, hamburgers, cotton candy, popcorn and refreshments to help raise money for equipment. Speeches began with Ewan Kelly who made a dedication on behalf of the Youth. Principal Jamie Moore then read some

words of congratulations sent in by Principal Brendan MacGillivray of Beaver Bank Kinsac Elementary School. Principal Moore then delivered his speech where he thanked everyone who helped with the project including Steve Buch who maintains the ice rink, Metro Paving and Eastern Fencing as well as the many parents and volunteers who contributed. He also told the story of how he became involved in the project and how he came to know Bonnie Ryan. He

said that with all the grant applications, hounding of politicians and fund-raising that she has done, she deserves to have her name attached to the project.

"This is not the first project I've ever done" says Bonnie who then spoke of the many projects she has been involved in. She said this past year has been especially trying due to her illness but that she has been getting through it with the help (Cont'd next page)

of her friends, family and this project. She said that when people ask her why she continues to volunteer she says it's because she likes the challenge, she likes the work, she likes to keep busy and because she can. She said that to do a project like this all you need is a goal, people to help and commitment.

The 48 x 85 foot sports pad boasts hockey nets, basketball nets and will soon have a net for

tennis and volleyball. It will also be turned into a skating rink in the winter. "The entire concept of this sports pad is that it is free." Bonnie said the money raised through the sale of concessions would go toward the purchase of sports equipment which residents are welcome to use as long as they put everything back and take care of it. She said they would also be looking at getting a large steel container to house the

equipment as well as benches to sit and get your skates on. By the end of her speech someone had already offered to sponsor the benches.

Following the speeches there was a plaque unveiling and ribbon cutting and then Bonnie got to take on 12 year old Mat McLeod with the first ceremonial slap shot!

## Recapturing the Joy



My name is Deborah Anthony and I have been a resident of Beaver Bank since 1977. In 1984, I was married with two daughters and in that same year I became a bereaved parent upon the death of my firstborn daughter, Erin. She was six years old at the time and died as the result of a school bus accident.

There is a saying in the grief community "once a bereaved parent, always a bereaved parent" and that is true insofar as having that label attached to us upon the death of one or more of our children. It is a label we have for life. However, it should not ever be misconstrued as meaning we must always remain sad and in that place of pain. It is possible for us to recapture our joy of life, which is also stolen in addition to our child. I was fortunate to be able to do that, although the journey was not completed until 2004. This twenty year journey was a long and arduous one; however, my life has been enriched by having won the battle. It is a battle that could be likened to being in a war; the only difference being the battle is with self and is fought inside the four walls of the home of a bereaved family. As a result of this loss in my life and what I learned on the grief trip, I had two passions emerge for me. One was to create a resource for bereaved parents that would assist them in restoring happiness into their life once again and the second passion was to work toward bridging the gap between

the griever and non-griever. Grief and pain are elements of life none of us escape and for which little preparation has been given. If we made a list of things that we are not comfortable with, I am sure grief would be on it. Part of that is connected to the myths, misconceptions, and expectations society holds around the topic of grief. My passions were brought to fruition and I am happy to have this opportunity to share them with you.

In 2006 I authored and published Recapturing the Joy "A Journal for Bereaved Parents". A resource to provide a starting point for bereaved parents in their necessity to re-create self which is what is required of us in order to "get back into life" with some semblance of true and authentic happiness. The first hurdle being the belief that we are allowed and capable of doing so.

In 2012 I created a site on Facebook entitled Bereavement Journal ~ Recapturing the Joy. A safe haven for both griever and non-griever to attach themselves for education and inspiration while on the journey. Over 3,000 individuals and 300 or so other FB pages have chosen to associate themselves and I am grateful.

In 2013 I authored and published Recapturing the Joy "Bridging the Grief Gap". A resource of no-nonsense, common-sense truths designed to get all of us comfortable with grief and communicating as we need to be and should be; while debunking some myths and working to remove some stigmas.

I am currently working on the third installment in this series "Pearls of Wisdom". A collection of life quotes I have written over the years based on what I have experienced throughout my life thus far.

## MP News and Views

### Provincial Election

Thank you to all of the candidates and their families, who ran in the recent provincial election campaign. I also extend a special thank you to my former NDP MLA colleagues Percy Paris, Sid Prest, Mat Whynott, and Becky Kent. We wish the new provincial Liberal government well.

### Remembrance Day

Please take the time this Remembrance Day to honour and remember our veterans, as well as their families, who bravely served our country and those who died in service. Please also take the time to thank our currently serving Canadian Forces and RCMP personnel and their families as well as firefighters, police, paramedics and other first responders.

### Parliament back in Session

Parliament resumed on October 16<sup>th</sup>. We have many issues to debate since Prime Minister Harper shut down parliamentary debate for an extra five weeks. When Parliament was prorogued this fall, it took away the public's democratic right to question the government on issues such as Syria, climate change, student assistance, employment insurance, the Senate spending scandal, the delay in replacing the Sea King helicopters, and the care of our veterans.

### Canadian Writer Alice Munro Wins the Nobel Prize for Literature

Alice Munro was awarded the Nobel Prize for literature last month. This latest honour is one of many awards that Ms. Munro has received, including the Man Booker International Prize, two Giller Prizes, and three Governor General's Literary Awards. Munro's richly evocative short stories have

helped tell Canada's story - both to Canadians and to others around the world.

Our whole country is proud of Munro's achievement. This achievement also highlights the importance of supporting our writers and other artists, an issue New Democrats believe should be a priority for the federal government.

### NDP Puts Forward Measures to Tackle Youth Unemployment

The youth unemployment rate is now double the national average. To tackle high levels of youth unemployment in Canada, New Democrats are proposing new tax credits for businesses that hire young Canadians. New Democrats are calling on the government to introduce tax credits to businesses hiring Canadians aged between 18 and 25. Under our proposal, businesses would be eligible for an

amount of up to \$1,000 for hiring a young employee and for matching funds for the training of a young employee. The tax credit would be doubled in regions of the country where youth unemployment is most dire.

We encourage the federal government to adopt our youth hiring tax credit policy as soon as possible to help reduce these high levels of youth unemployment in our country. It is a promising tax credit that would benefit our workers and the businesses who hire them.

Every summer at 95 Kinsac Road something special happens. Snapping turtles and painted turtles make their way from Duck Lake to the lawn of the BBCLC and dig into a sandy comfortable spot for 1-2 days and lay their eggs. Every effort is made to identify the spots and barricades are put up to protect the nests until hatching time-which is usually late September to mid-October.
