News from Station 48



For the months of May and June your Fire Dept. has responded to 12 calls. They consisted of: 1 brush fire, 1 CO detector, 1 public assistance for an electrical issue, 1 illegal burn, 2 alarms activated, 2 structure fires, 2 MVA and 2 medical assists. This brings our total for the year to 56. Due to a change to the EHS protocols the number of medical assist calls we would normally attend is down.

After a long cool spring, I am hoping by the time you get to read this article that we will be having some warm summer weather. Hopefully by now the forest has greened up and the threat of forest fire is low.

I hope everyone who has been having an open fire have been going on to the Department of Natural Resources web site and checking the fire map before burning. All of the rules and regulations for open air burning in Nova Scotia can be found on their web site. If you do not have access to a computer you can call

for a recorded message that will give you the daily restrictions by county. The toll free number is 1-855-564-BURN (2876). Keep in mind that under no circumstances can you burn between the hours of 8:00am and 2:00pm.

Halifax Regional Fire & Emergency will continue to work with the Department of Natural Resources to bring our fire regulations closer in line with each other. But you need to know that at this time the open air burning bylaws for HRM are not the same as those of the Province of Nova Scotia. Please make sure if you plan to burn that you check both the DNR regulations and the HRM regulations as they both apply at the same time.

I would like to remind people to stay safe while swimming this summer. Do not swim too far out over your head unless you are a capable swimmer especially if you are swimming in the ocean. Also make sure you know what is

below the surface and how deep the water is if you are diving into the water. Remember to never dive into a backyard swimming pool unless it is a pool designed for diving. And most important, always keep a close eye on small children when they are playing around water and to always keep your gate locked around your swimming pool if it is not attended by an adult.

Please drop into the Fire Station any Tuesday night between the hours of 7:00pm and 8:00pm to order your blue reflective civic number signs. This is the least expensive thing you will ever do to protect your family when emergency services need to find you quickly.

Remember if we can't find you we can't help you!

Goodbye for now and play safe.

If you see bats, please report them, and help track the status of Nova Scotia's bat population. Last year, more than 1,000 bat sightings were reported to the website and hotline. Nova Scotians can report bat sightings at <http://www.batconservation.ca> or by calling 1-866-727-3447, (toll-free).

Three species of bats were designated endangered in Nova Scotia last year after 95 per cent of the population was wiped out by a fungus.

Funding to Provide Respite Support for Foster Parents

The province is supporting foster parents by providing more respite care funding. Community Services Minister Joanne Bernard

says the support is in keeping with recent efforts to support women and children in transition, and in appreciation of foster families' contributions and caring for children who need temporary homes.



News and Views

Canadians were shocked and saddened by the shooting in Moncton last month that killed three RCMP officers and injured two others. Our thoughts are with the family members of those who lost their lives, their loved ones, and the men and women who serve in the RCMP. This tragic event is a reminder of the very real danger that police officers face every day in protecting our communities.

70th Anniversary of D-Day

Last month, a delegation of veterans, family members and government representatives travelled to France to participate in commemorations to mark the 70th anniversary of D-Day and the Battle of Normandy. As Veterans Affairs Critic for the NDP, I was honoured to attend along with almost one hundred veterans, family members, and one thousand youth representatives. On June 6, 1944, nearly 21,000 Canadians took part in the Normandy landings with the goal to free Europe from the Nazi regime. We will never forget the soldiers who fought for our freedom and sacrificed their lives for the benefit of all.

A National Aging Strategy

The NDP undertook consultation with seniors and stakeholders to build a National Aging Strategy. Irene Mathysen, the critic for seniors, released the strategy last month and outlined plans to boost financial security for seniors and improve quality of life. The NDP would reverse the government's cuts to seniors by reinstating the age of eligibility for Old Age security benefits and Guaranteed Income Supplement to age 65.

NDP consulting small business to develop strategy

Small businesses are the backbone of our country, contributing almost one-third of our country's GDP. They also represent the majority of businesses in Canada. Over the summer, several of my NDP MP colleagues will consult with small business on proposals that would help them grow and thrive. Some of the proposals include restoring the small business hiring tax credit that was cut by the current government in the last budget, reducing taxes for small business, creating a new tax credit for businesses that hire youth, improved financing to help owners grow their business, and making it easier for parents to pass family businesses to their kids. Need for an international climate treaty

For the last five years, Prime Minister Stephen Harper has skipped the United Nations Climate Summit. While this government continues to deny the effects of climate change, the NDP fully supports taking action to combat climate change and supports an international climate treaty.

Increased carbon emissions continue to have devastating impacts on our world. In 2009, my MP colleague Megan Leslie (Halifax) introduced a bill called the Climate Change Accountability Act. This bill outlined our plan to reduce greenhouse gas emissions to 25% below 1990 levels by 2020 and 80% by 2050 and to establish independent reviews to ensure that government measures reach targets. Unfortunately, Canada's unelected Senate struck down our bill in a snap vote. The bill has since been re-tabled a number of times. We will continue to pressure this government to support a legally binding international climate treaty.
