

CIOE on 97.5 FM Coming Soon!



Beaver Bank Kinsac and area residents are only weeks away from having their own dedicated community radio voice as CIOE-FM prepares to launch its long awaited local programming service on frequency 97.5.

After nearly three years, Jim Robson, Chairman of Cobequid Radio Society, advises that the CRTC has licensed CIOE-FM and has allocated the 97.5 frequency which will enable the not-for-profit community radio station to fulfill its mandate to provide a full broadcasting service to residents throughout the entire Cobequid Region.

"My colleagues and I have been working diligently these past months to establish our exciting new facilities and broadcast studios which are located at 11

Glendale Avenue, Unit 3, in Lower Sackville," noted Robson.

The station's central location provides easy access for residents from every part of the Cobequid Region. CIOE is owned, operated and managed by the community and as such, residents are encouraged to drop by and visit.

As a non-profit entity, CIOE's entire operation is volunteer driven which means the station is looking for volunteers who want to become actively involved. Any Beaver Bank Kinsac residents interested in volunteering at CIOE should email jimrrobson@live.ca or contact Rae Marlborough, the Beaver Bank Kinsac representative on the Cobequid Radio Society's Board of Directors, which is the parent organization of CIOE-FM.

CIOE will have a profoundly beneficial

impact on Beaver Bank Kinsac and the nearly 30 local communities within its coverage contours. The station will operate 24/7 and will provide 90 hours of music based programming and 36 hours of locally relevant, community driven spoken word programming each week.

"Our eclectic music mix will reach out to the Cobequid Region's broad demographic spectrum and provide a blending of East Coast, Classic Country, Easy Listening Classics, Celtic, Blues, Acadian, Folk, Bluegrass, Fiddle, Rock A Billy, Gospel, Multicultural, Military and Newfoundland, among other musical genres," explained Robson.

With respect to spoken word programming, CIOE, through its team of dedicated community volunteers, will cover the news, events and activities of each Cobequid community on a daily basis. The station will inform, entertain and

educate its listeners, reflect the uniqueness of each community, and foster greater understanding and awareness among neighboring communities by giving the various community groups a radio voice.

Beyond the many benefits accruing to area listeners, CIOE will also greatly assist the business communities throughout the Cobequid Region by providing small business owners with affordable, cost efficient advertising rates, thus enabling them to better reach and serve their local customer base.

CIOE-FM will also champion the cause of local talent by providing both new and emerging artists and established performers with on-air exposure of their music as well as profiling them as individuals. The most valuable service that any broadcaster can render talent is to showcase their work over the air which is precisely what CIOE-FM on 97.5 will do.

While this article for the Beaver Bank Kinsac Bulletin barely scratches the surface of the many exciting things in store for listeners when CIOE goes to air early in the New Year Mr. Robson invites any residents wanting more information to contact him at the above noted email address, or visit our fabulous new website which is in its final stages of design.

Christmas in Beaver Bank





News from Station 48

Since my last article your Fire Dept. has responded to 11 calls. They consisted of: 1 power pole fire, 1 brush fire, 1 CO detector, 1 illegal burn, 1 medical assist, 2 structure fires, and 4 alarms activated. This brings our total for the year to 100. Fire calls are way down over the past couple months so I am glad to see people are being fire safe.

I hope everyone had a great Christmas and are having a happy New Year. With winter comes the use of wood burning appliances to keep our homes warm and cozy. Hopefully you were able to get your wood early giving it plenty of time to dry. If you are burning wood that is not seasoned properly you may be causing additional creosote in your chimney that may not be there with good dry wood. In either case you need to keep a watchful eve on the creosote buildup in your chimney and clean it on a regular basis.

If you have been looking at that big pile of brush in the backyard wondering when would be a good



time to burn it this is the time. With the cold and wet conditions of winter it is the ideal time to get outside and burn the unwanted brush from around your property. Please make sure you check the regulations to ensure you can burn in your area and that you have the proper clearances.

With winter driving comes winter breakdowns and emergencies that can leave you stranded for extended periods of time in your vehicle. Everyone should carry a winter emergency kit in their car especially if you travel at night or travel in remote areas. Items like candles, energy bars, water and blankets can help you survive in your car if you are stranded for extended periods of time.

With the shorter days we do a lot of driving in the dark and one of the things I notice is how many people now have the reflective blue civic signs at the bottom of their driveways. Unfortunately when I drive around in the daylight I see a lot of homes that do not even have a civic number on their

house or it is in a location that makes it hard to see in the daylight and impossible to see at night. Please drop by the Fire Station on a Tuesday night and we would be happy to set you up with one of the inexpensive reflective blue civic numbers so you can be part of the growing number of people who can easily be found when it matters most.

In closing I want to congratulate two of our new members, Rob Miller and Joel Misson, who graduated from their firefighter training course on December 18th. This is a major accomplishment taking many weeks of personal time to complete. Congratulations Rob and Joel the residents of Beaver Bank Kinsac are now safer having two more trained firefighters in our community who are ready to respond when the call for help comes in.

Goodbye for now, drive safe and I will talk to you all in the spring.

Halifax Aerotech Waste Water Treatment Plant to get \$21M Upgrade

Taxpayers will spend \$21 million to upgrade the Halifax Aerotech waste water treatment plant by 2016. Ottawa, Nova Scotia and Halifax will share costs equally. The project will expand the plant's capacity and meet new federal waste water regulations. The Aerotech plant will be able to accommodate future development at Stanfield Airport and the Aerotech Park. The upgrade will position Stanfield to take advantage of a new Canada-European Union Free Trade Agreement. Halifax Mayor Mike Savage says the project was one of the city's highest priorities under the Build Canada Infrastructure program. "Expansion has been on hold until we could upgrade the facility," Savage said at Monday's announcement.

Program to Help Nova Scotians take their Business to the next level

Nova Scotian businesses now have access to training to take advantage of major projects. Businesses can take a customized workplace education program where they will build skills and knowledge needed to land contracts in major projects, like shipbuilding, the Maritime Link and offshore oil exploration.

Topics include pricing for profit, budgeting and financial management, as well as sales and negotiation training to bid on, and win, jobs. Those interested in taking or offering the training, can call Workplace Education Initiatives at 1-866-562-0100.

Hundreds Offer Input to Help Shape Sexual Violence Strategy Plan

Over 800 Nova Scotians shared their perspectives to help shape an action plan for the province's first sexual violence strategy. Community Services Minister Joanne Bernard says she is committed to continuing to talk with the community to develop a province wide response. The goal is for victims and survivors, and their families, to get the help they need and ensure society works to prevent sexual violence.

Emergency officials work to ensure the readiness of our communities, municipalities and province in an emergency event. However, individuals also have a responsibility to ensure their own safety and that of their family. Being prepared means:

- Knowing the risks,
- Preparing a plan, and

Being aware of the potential risks we face in Nova Scotia can help individuals be better prepared should an emergency occur. People may find it helpful to make a list of these risks and think about how these might affect them and their family.

Preparing a plan


Everyone needs an emergency plan. It will help them to know what to do if an emergency should occur.

News and Views

Happy New Year

On behalf of my wife Andrea, my family, and my staff, I wish you the very best in 2015.

\$1.1 Billion Dollars in "Lapsed Funds" at Veterans Affairs

Figures show that the government returned over \$1.1 billion in funds allocated by Parliament for veterans' benefits and services since 2006. On an annual basis, the Department of Veterans Affairs returned this unused money as these funds "were not demanded." I find it unconscionable that this government has not used these allocated funds when so many veterans and their families are in need of improved benefits." I have called on Minister Fantino to explain why he has never delivered this assistance to veterans and their families even though Parliament has approved the expenditure of this money.

This has been a 'decade of darkness" for veterans under this Conservative government. Over 900 jobs at Veterans Affairs Canada have been cut since 2009, nine district offices across the country have been closed, and the Auditor General recently released a report critical of the federal government's delivery of mental health programs for veterans. At the same time, this government has paid generous bonuses to senior level managers at VAC and consistently 'lapsed" spending in two main spending categories - health care and disability and death compensation for veterans and their families. Is it not ironic that after years of deep cuts to Veterans Affairs that they are now rehiring front line staff? Veterans and their families need better programs and services. I call on the federal government to step up and implement much needed improvements to veterans' programs and services.

Omnibus Budget Bill

The government introduced another omnibus budget bill this fall. The 450-page bill introduced countless measures unrelated to the budget itself. With these omnibus budget bills, Members of Parliament must vote on thousands of items that affect programs and services as well as items for government expenditure. We continue to ask the federal government to introduce stand-alone bills that can be debated and scrutinized properly.

Protect the Sambro Lighthouse

held a press conference in November with members of the Nova Scotia Lighthouse Preservation Society, the Sambro Island Lighthouse Heritage Society, several veterans, and my colleague MP Megan Leslie. We want the federal government to assume ownership of the historic Sambro Island lighthouse in cooperation with Parks Canada and a partner community group. We are also asking the federal government to provide some financial support to community groups to help maintain and support these historic structures.

The Sambro Island lighthouse is an important part of our history, our story, and our heritage. To many veterans going to war, the Sambro Island lighthouse was the last light these veterans saw leaving Canada and the first they saw upon their return. The Sambro light also

greeted thousands of immigrants on their arrival to Canada. It would be a shame if Ottawa does not protect this very significant lighthouse.

Megan Leslie has tabled a bill in the House of Commons (Bill C-588) to protect the historic Nova Scotia lighthouse and gathered over 5,000 signatures on a petition.

The local community is supportive of this initiative and wants the federal government to designate the Sambro Island Lighthouse as a heritage lighthouse. Ottawa must play a role to ensure the long term preservation of this important lighthouse."

Provincial Heating Assistance Program

Service Nova Scotia is once again administering a \$200 rebate under the Heating Assistance Rebate Program (HARP) for low-income Nova Scotians. To qualify, you must be able to prove you pay for heat and meet the single income threshold of \$27,000 net or combined income of \$42,000 net. You must apply for the heating assistance rebate by March 31, 2015. You can find the application form online, at a Service or Access Nova Scotia office or by calling 1-800-670-4357.


