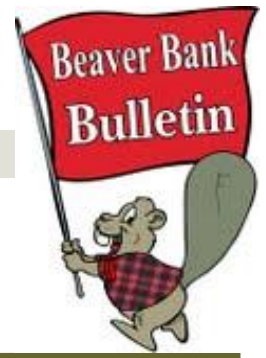

Do you have concerns about speeding in your community?

North Beaver Bank Wind Project



The finishing touches have been accomplished. The four wind turbines at North Beaver Bank across from the Villa are spinning with the wind. Many years of planning and design-work go into the installation of the turbine, but just a few weeks of construction see the large generators installed and the blades lifted to the sky.

This project by Scotian Wind is a Community Feed-In-Tariff project under the program of the Nova

Scotia government that is designed to encourage smaller wind projects that are Nova Scotian owned. The project at North Beaver Bank consists of four turbines that have a capacity of 8MW and generate enough electricity to power the equivalent of approximately 2,700 Nova Scotian homes.

All energy generated by these turbines will be consumed locally as they are connected directly to

the local grid. No power is shipped elsewhere. The electricity feeds directly into the local Beaver Bank distribution lines to power local businesses and homes.

News from Station 48



Since the start of 2015 your Fire Dept. has responded to 23 calls. They consisted of: 1 investigation call, 1 special assistance, 1 smoke condition, 2 vehicle fires, 3 alarms activated, 4 medical assists, 5 motor vehicle accidents and 6 structure fires.

By the time you are reading this I hope the winter weather is coming to an end and the spring weather is just around the corner. With spring also come the Provincial and Municipal outdoor burning restrictions. As of March 15 you will need to check the Department of Natural Resources website for the fire restrictions map. You will need to follow the time of day restrictions as stated by DNR. Halifax has its own set of burning restrictions so don't forget to check the Halifax website as well before you do any outdoor burning. Remember you can drop by the fire station any Tuesday night between 7:00pm and 8:00pm and we would be happy to explain all of the burning restrictions you would need to know.

Spring will also mean the start of daylight savings time and the time you should change the batteries in all of your battery operated smoke detectors. Speaking of batteries you need to be cautious when disposing of old batteries, especially 9 volt batteries. Even though a battery may not have enough power to use in your electronic items they still have enough power to start a fire. If the positive and negative terminals are crossed on a battery by something that will conduct

electricity, it can generate enough heat to start a fire. To be safe you should cover the terminals on a battery with electrical tape before you dispose of them to ensure an electrical connection cannot be made. Check the internet for videos regarding fires started by batteries.

This is an exciting year for the Beaver Bank Kinsac Volunteer Fire Department as we will be celebrating our 50th anniversary in June. We have made every attempt to contact all past members of our department but some still may not know about our anniversary. So if you know any past members please contact them and let them know. We will also be hosting an open house for the public during our anniversary

weekend so I hope a lot of you can make it out to visit and see what a wonderful fire station you have in your community.

In closing, I want to thank all of our fire fighters and officers for the countless hours of training, attending fire calls, attending meetings and standing by at the station during some of the major snowstorms we had during the past winter. Without the dedication of these volunteers we would not have the high quality fire department coverage we have today.

Goodbye for now, drive safe and I will talk to you next time.

Consultation Begins on Sunday Hunting

Nova Scotians are invited to contribute their opinions on lifting the ban on Sunday hunting.

The Nova Scotia Wildlife Act states that, for the most part, no one is allowed to hunt on Sundays. The Mi'kmaq have the right to hunt on any day. Lifting the ban would mean that anyone with the appropriate license could hunt on Sundays during hunting season. "In my travels across Nova Scotia, I've met various people who wish to discuss the prospect of Sunday hunting," said Zach Churchill, Minister of Natural Resources. "No decision has been made but the public consultation will provide further information about how Nova Scotians feel with regard to this issue."

Nova Scotians can access background information and the consultation questionnaire online at www.novascotia.ca/natr/hunt/sunday or by calling 902-424-7955. The consultation period will be open from today, Feb. 13, until midnight, Friday, April 10.

About 50,000 Nova Scotians hold hunting licenses. Depending on the species, hunting season usually runs from early September to early December.

Province Keeps Seniors' Pharmacare Affordable

The Nova Scotia Government will maintain the annual maximum premiums and co-payments for the Seniors' Pharmacare Program in 2015-16.

Seniors currently pay a maximum premium of \$424.00 and a maximum co-payment of \$382.00. These rates haven't changed since 2007. About half of all seniors in the program do not pay a premium at all.

Government is removing the cost-sharing formula that had been used to calculate the premiums and co-payments seniors paid each year. By removing the formula, program costs can be affordably spread across the growing number of new clients every year. There are about 123,000 seniors enrolled in the program, an increase of twenty-two-thousand people compared with 2009-10. Nova Scotia continues to work to lower the cost of drugs through the province's Fair Drug Pricing strategy, and its participation in the Pan-Canadian Competitive Value Price Initiative for Generic Drugs.

The Seniors' Pharmacare Program is a provincial drug insurance plan that helps eligible seniors with the cost of their prescription drugs. The total program cost was 169.5 million in 2014-15.

Program Connects Graduates with First Jobs

A new provincial government program connects post-secondary graduates with their first full-time job in Nova Scotia.

Graduate to Opportunity provides an incentive to employers to hire new graduates on a full-time basis. Employers can receive 25 per cent of salary costs back in the first year, and 12 ½ % in the second year. Economic and Rural Development and Tourism Minister Michel Samson says the program positions the private sector to lead the way in employing young people, and gives graduates a running start to their careers.

The incentive is available to businesses with fewer than 100

employees, startup companies, social enterprises, not-for-profits and registered charities. For more information, visit



Premiers Approve Plan to Improve Labour Mobility for Apprentices

Beginning next year, apprentices can have their hours worked and technical training recognized across Canada, no matter where they receive it. Premier Stephen McNeil, who is lead on the plan, shared the details during the meeting of Canada's premiers in Ottawa on Friday (January 30th). The premier says the plan will make it easier for Nova Scotians who begin their apprenticeship elsewhere, to come home to continue training and certification. The agreement will also make it easier for employers to get the skilled workers they need.

News and Views

Thank-you to all first responders including firefighters, municipal police, RCMP, paramedics, and others who helped with the removal of dangerous chemicals and hazardous materials from a cottage in Grand Desert last month. I also want to thank area residents who showed patience during the evacuation order and allowed our first responders to continue in their efforts to make the area safe.

Government Delays Federal Budget

Last month, the government announced they would delay the release of their federal budget until April because of low oil prices and market instability. This delay is worrisome. As 2015 is a federal election year, Canadians deserve to know the details of the federal budget. Canadians need to know how this federal government plans to take action on issues such as unemployment, job growth, and other pressing concerns. I am also concerned that a delay in the federal budget will affect the ability of parliamentarians to scrutinize the budget in advance of the federal election.

Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC)

Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC) is Canada's official source of citizenship and immigration information. For information about immigrating to Canada and visas for work, study and visiting, please visit the [CIC website](http://www.cic.gc.ca) at www.cic.gc.ca. You can now complete most applications online. Citizenship and Immigration Canada receives tens of thousands of applications every year. Application processing times vary greatly depending on application class and location. We encourage constituents to consult current processing times with CIC before seeking an update on

an application. Unfortunately, employee cuts at CIC have increased delays and processing times for applicants. As well, it is important to know that my constituency office **cannot** speed up the processing of an immigration application. Constituents who have sponsored or made an immigration application can obtain secure status updates on their file by utilizing the CIC Online Service called Client Application Status or by calling the national CIC Call Centre Service at: 1-888-242-2100.

Canadians Travelling Abroad

If you plan to travel abroad this year, please ensure that you are prepared and have an up to date passport. **REMEMBER your passport is the only proof of your Canadian citizenship and identity that is accepted in all countries.** You and all family members should have a valid passport if you plan to travel outside Canada. Permission to enter another country is the sole prerogative of that country. Verify in advance whether your destination country or countries require a visa for entry, and apply well in advance. Some countries require that you have at least 6 months left in your passport in order to be eligible for a visa or travel to that country. If you are a permanent resident, please ensure you have renewed your permanent resident card before you travel. It can take up to 6 months for CIC to process a permanent resident card renewal. For more

information on permanent resident cards, please see www.cic.gc.ca. You may also want to register your travel with the Department of Foreign Affairs. Registration of Canadians Abroad is a free service offered by Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development Canada that keeps you connected to Canada in case of an emergency abroad, such as an earthquake or civil unrest, or an emergency at home. You can register online at www.travel.gc.ca. In the event of an **EMERGENCY** abroad, the Department of Foreign Affairs Emergency Operations Centre is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week and offers assistance. From outside Canada, you can reach the emergency centre by calling: 613-996-8885 (call collect where available). For more information visit: www.voyage.gc.ca

Government cuts Disaster Relief for Provinces

The federal government quietly revealed a change that will cut funding to provinces and communities that are hit by disasters. A recent news release outlines that the government has raised the amount of storm damage needed to qualify for federal disaster assistance from \$1 million to \$3 million dollars. This change was announced with no warning and no consultation with the provinces. Unfortunately, this change will make it more difficult for provinces to get disaster relief, including Nova Scotia. As we continue to see an increase in

extreme weather events, it does not make sense to cut money from a disaster relief program that helps Canadian communities when they are the most vulnerable. This change in disaster relief will create financial hardship for many communities and provinces. According to Mark Furey, the Nova Scotia Minister of Emergency Measures, out of fourteen storms

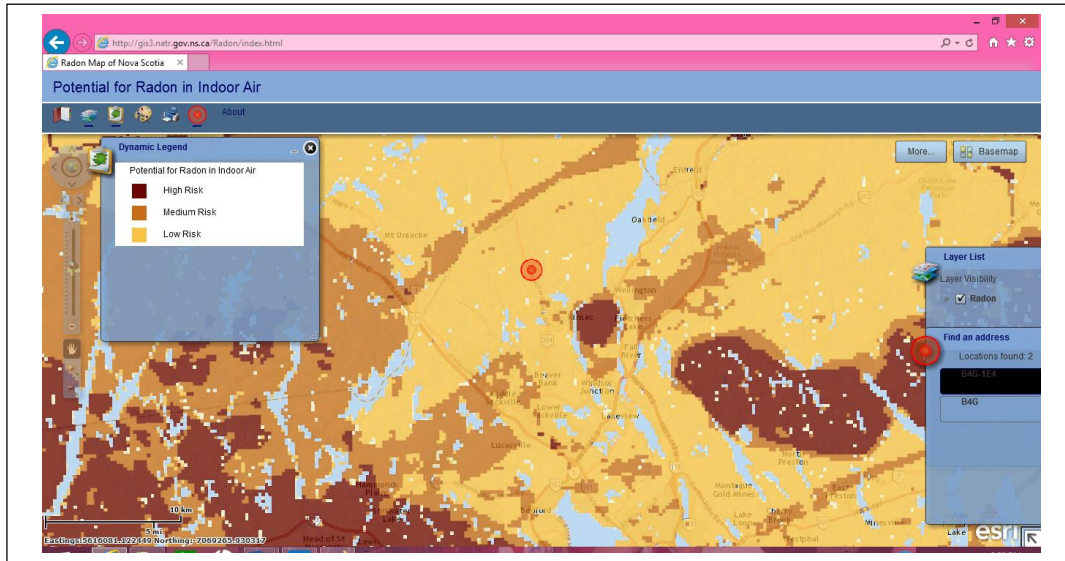
dating back to 1999, eight of these storms would not have qualified under the new threshold and that scenario would have amounted to a \$20 million loss to the province.

Small pockets of radon in Beaver Bank



GIS map shows the areas within Nova Scotia with low, medium and high risk potential for radon (Rn) in indoor air.

Radon is a naturally occurring, colourless and odourless gas that is radioactive and known to cause lung cancer. In fact, it is the second leading cause of lung cancer after smoking and the leading cause of the disease among non-smokers (World Health Organization, 2009). Radon is generated naturally from the radioactive decay of uranium. Both elements are found in varying amounts in all the soils and rocks throughout our province.

To view the province's GIS (Geographic Information System) map which displays the potential for radon in indoor air in Nova Scotia, please visit their website at <http://gis3.natr.gov.ns.ca/Radon/index.html>. This interactive map allows you to enter your address or postal code and pinpoints your location in order to determine whether you fall in a low, medium or high risk area. The map shows a few small pockets of medium risk areas in Beaver Bank but it appears to be mainly low risk. Higher risk areas are found in the Fall River area, Mount Uniacke and Hammonds Plains.

The Nova Scotia Department of Health and Wellness recommends that all homeowners in the province test their homes for radon. Many studies carried out globally have shown conclusively that, although the percentage of homes exceeding established radon guidelines can vary from area to area, there are

no areas completely devoid of homes with high radon. No matter where you live, the only way you will know for sure whether or not your home has high Rn is to complete a proper Rn test (Health Canada, 2008).
