Flu Information Session to be Held at Community Centre Oct 19th

On Monday, October 19th, 2009, from 6 pm until 9 pm at the Beaver Bank Community Center, the Public Health Nurse will be holding an information and education session on Influenza 2009-2010 that will update community mem-

bers, parents, and all community groups (for ex: Girl Guides and Scouting) about influenza, colds, and H1N1 and more. This is open to anyone and I encourage as many residents and organizations that impact on children (for ex: daycares) to attend since this information is beneficial.

Capital Health, Public Health & School Health Program staff recognized that in September 2009 they would need to be prepared to deal with requests from schools and school commu-

nities for information and resources in response to the recent H1N1 pandemic. A group came together in the summer as a health promotion community of practice to strategize how they might respond to the school and community requests.


While there was an abundance of information on influenza, H1N1 and infection control available, it was decided that the School Health Program staff would focus on hand, cough and sneeze hygiene education and proper techniques.

Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) and the Department of Health Promotion and Protection provided (HPP) foundation for resources; however the working group viewed all materials available from a variety of sources and identified those that seemed the best fit for school and community groups.

Burning Permits Needed Until October 15th

For the months of July and August the alarm has sounded 25 times. These calls consisted of: 1 air emergency standby, 1 brush fire, 1 vehicle fire, 1 alarm activation, 6 MVA's and 15 medical assist calls. This brings our total for the year so far to 121. This is up from the previous year by over 20%.

I was glad to see we didn't get hit too badly by the last two weather events we had. It was also nice to see people are taking these events a little more serious now than in the past. There are many more people out there who are ready and prepared to be on their own for the first 72 hours in the event one of these storms hits us hard.

Cooler weather is also here and that means it's time to make sure all of your heating appliances are cleaned and ready to go. Cleaning chimneys and having your furnace tuned up makes for a safer and more efficient heating season.

It won't be long and Old Man Winter will be here. That means getting the vehicle ready. Making sure your vehicle is running well and have a good set of winter tires are both good ways to prevent ending up stranded or worse, in the ditch. I'm a firm believer in winter tires, not all seasons, for the winters we get.

Burning permit season is over as of Oct 15th so you won't need any permits again until April 15th. This year was another great brush burning season here in Beaver Bank. We hardly had any illegal burns or brush fires, a job well done. Let's see if we can aim for a chimney fire free heating season.

In closing, remember, seatbelts, smoke detectors and helmets save lives...so use them.

An Update From Councillor Dalrymple

With school back in we are quickly moving from a so-so Summer season weather wise into what appears to be a fantastic Fall. First and foremost I would like to remind everyone that with school now back in session the streets and roads are full of young and excited children and one of the biggest problems we face in our District is far too much speeding on our residential streets and in our subdivisions, I am asking and reminding drivers again to please slow down.

I would like to start off with a huge thanks to the many volunteers throughout our District, both past and present who put on our Annual Fairs and Community Events. This Summer I was lucky enough to be able to attend some of the July 1st Canada Day festivities in Beaver Bank & Lakeview and they were spectacular and so many of our citizens went out and attended, the fire works in Beaver Bank by all accounts were a huge success. Thank you, thank you wonderful volunteers community supporters & businesses who make these events a blast for our families and residents.

I would like to touch on a few Community Projects that are just finishing or about to finish up, all of these are just samples of the great things our people do here. The new Seniors Archives Room at the LWF Community Hall on the Fall River Road is 90% complete, our Seniors & Historical Society will have their own place to display the history of our communities plus have their own space. The Woodbine Family Association hosted a free barbecue at the Brown Hall where

they handed out Emergency Preparation Kits for residents. The Association has worked very hard in obtaining a grant through the Cobequid Community Development Board, having meetings and doing fundraising to be able to put these kits together for the benefit of our residents. The Beaver Bank Kinsac Keeners (Seniors) held a fundraising fun day at the BBK Centre to raise funds for their plans of installing a patio area and gardens etc at the Centre. For \$10 you can buy a donation "square" for the project.

Summer is of course, a time to get some Public Works projects completed and I am very pleased with the amount of paving we have seen throughout our district this year. Sections of the Beaver Bank Road among others have been done, while streets like Pinebrook in Beaver Bank are about to be. Last week I attended the first meeting planning the list for next year and I was very pleased to see the Dept's list of what they consider our worst streets and my list are very close. Without question the one big disappointment is that the next portion of sidewalk installation along the Beaver Bank Road (from HTB north) ran into unforeseeable problems and has been delayed to next Spring, but the good part of that is that there is now a far more likely chance that next vear the whole section up to Meadow will be done all at once.

There has been a huge increase in the amount of sub-division and community groups that have come forward to organize and are looking at putting in playgrounds and parks, this is wonderful news for all of our communities, there are too many to list but contact me if you want to know if your sub-division already has a group. One new one is Lost Creek in Beaver Bank and congrats by the way to them for raising close to \$1,100 on their recent draw for golfing at the Lost Creek Course, thanks also to Larry for donating the prizes.


We are very close to installing a new bike park at the Beaver Bank Commons, this was delayed as we needed to find an extra \$10,000.00 to put in a smaller offshoot road, these funds are in place and I expect the bike park to go in within two weeks. Along that line we are also doing some minor upgrades and repairs to the Skatepark there. They are having their Skate Jam on Sept 26th. We also have funding and initial plans to begin the playground at Delaney Drive but are waiting on availability of resources (manpower and equipment) to get this work completed.

Thank you to the residents along Lockview Road by the High School who have called or emailed about the new "no parking" signs we had installed there, I've been by a number of times and notice it is much safer for residents vehicles and much better with garbage not being thrown everywhere.

I would like to welcome Cst Mike Bracken who arrived over the Summer as our new Community Policing Officer and I have already run into him many times all over our communities, so he is certainly getting out there and meeting people. There have also been a couple of Citizens on Patrol Meetings to get this very important organization back up and running throughout our area and it appears we are on target to do so by the end of September. We still need more volunteers, if you can give your community one or two 4 hour shifts a month to make this an even better place to live, please contact Cst Bracken or get in touch with me and I will get you the info you need.

I would like to touch on just a few of the newer projects we are working on, some of those are: We are moving forward trying to turn the old Stn 45 Fire Building (near Sobeys) into an HRM Fire Museum and there is a group of veteran

and retired Fire Officers who are interested in setting up and running this as a Museum which I believe would be a wonderful addition to our communities. I have recently been approved to replace the former Councillor Younger as the HRM's rep on the Shubie Canal Commission, this is a position I had sought as the Commission has already done and has lots of future plans for this District. Included in these works are walking trails, waterway projects and possibly in the near future the refurbishing of one of our old locks into making it operational again.

An update on an often-asked question: While the process seems brutally slow we continue to make progress towards a water solution for Monarch/Rivendale subdivisions in Beaver Bank. The first community vote was overwhelmingly in favour of continuing towards a municipal water solution and Halifax Water is in the process of designing the entire system and costing it out. I intend to keep pushing for the HRM to contribute in some financial way and an application has been filed with the Province for funding. As soon as the design and costing is complete, residents will be notified to attend a second Public Meeting at the BBKCC and I anticipate that to come very quickly.

I am very pleased to say that a special

project of mine has also now begun and that is the opening of a Community Website. This past month we opened www.barrydal. com with the first two pages started up. Page one is general information and page two is a Sports Page where all local Sports & Recreation groups can send me their link and we will put it on so that people can have easy one stop access to organizations and groups

in our area, just click on any sports group logo and it will take you directly to their website. The page we are now working on is the COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS AND GROUPS LINKS and any community group that would like to be linked here, just send me your permission and info barry@barrydal.com The district2news and BBCAA have already given their permission and as soon as we get a few we will open this page, down the road page 4 will be Community Events & Notices page. There is no charge for any of this as it is to be a community service.



What is a Paver Progress Clock?

Between the Beaver Bank Kinsac Community Centre and Beaver Bank Kinsac Elementary School, a clock has suddenly appeared! This is no ordinary clock. The Paver Progress Clock will track the number of square feet of pavers purchased by community members.

The Rebirth of the Beaver Bank Brown Hall

Back in 1921 a group of Beaver Bank citizens got together and decided they needed a community hall. So with lots of fundraising and hard work a small brown building was built on 351 Beaver Bank Road, known today as the Brown Hall.

The hall has been used over the years for many activities. The 2nd Beaver Bank Scouts used the hall for their meeting place and still do today. Other activities consisting of birthday parties, baby showers, anniversary parties and even weddings have been held in this small hall.

Over the past 80 years or so, the many people that have used this hall has finally taken its toll on the old building and it was in need on some upgrades. In 2007 the Woodbine Family Association started a senior's luncheon program, which has become quite successful. The Association along with the trustees of the hall decided the small community hall was in need of some upgrades. Association applied for and received a grant through the Cobequid Health Board, and with this grant the group was able to get the electrical upgrade completed. Mr. Kenny MacIssac and Mr. Mark McRitchie greatly provided their expertise and discounted products for the electrical upgrade. We were also able to renovate the kitchen to improve the senior's luncheons.

During the electrical upgrade and kitchen renovation, Percy Paris came and donated \$1000.00 to the hall for anything that was needed. The Association decided that what was needed was a new fridge and stove so with agreement of the trustees a new fridge and stove was purchased for the kitchen for the hall.

In the past year the Woodbine Family Association, in dealing with seniors through the winter months noticed the hall needed more major upgrades. The old hall was drafty and cold in the winter and many of the seniors found it uncomfortable, so again the WFA applied for another grant, this time through New Horizons in November 2008. This grant was successfully received and the construction began the end of June of 2009.

The grant included improvements

such as new windows, insulated walls, new flooring, upgrade of bathrooms, and new gyprock and painted walls. The Association helped with the demo, and Ascot construction was hired to do the major renovations. Hantz Insulators came in and donated their time and insulation to insulate the walls and ceiling which was never insulated before.

Now that the hall is upgraded the Association has worked to get the hall approved as a place to go during an emergency situation. The Association has formed an evacuation committee to help with emergency preparedness for residents of Woodbine Mobile Home Park. This committee has worked with EMO and the red cross to get things

On September 12th the Woodbine Family Association held its 3rd annual BBO up at the hall to show it off. Outside there were games for the kids, cotton candy and free hot dogs and pop for everyone. Inside the hall, people were welcome to come in and view its new interior. Displays were set up inside the hall to see what the new evacuation committee has been up to, with new evacuation kits and lots of information about emergency preparedness everyone to see.

The outside of the hall is the same but now a new hall on the inside is ready for another 80 years. So the answer to a question that has been asked for many years and many more to come is: why is it called the Brown Hall? The answer will always be because it's brown.

Passing of Two Prominent Nova Scotians

Two prominent Nova Scotians, Donald Marshall Junior and Commodore Bruce Oland, recently passed away. The accomplishments of both men will leave an indelible mark on the province. Mr. Marshall was wrongfully convicted of murder and a public inquiry into Mr. Marshall's treatment led to profound changes in the province's justice system and an acknowledgement of institutional racism. Mr. Marshall was also instrumental in securing native fishing and hunting rights through a landmark Supreme Court decision.

Commodore Bruce Oland was a well-known businessman and had a distinguished military career. He served in the Second World War and was involved in the militia and Royal Canadian Naval Reserve for almost forty years. He served as president of Oland Breweries Ltd. and was involved in several other businesses. Mr. Oland was also active in many community organizations and charities and received the Order of Canada.

Ottawa needs to take Leadership on H1N1 Flu Preparedness

Many experts are predicting a second wave of an H1N1 flu pandemic this fall and advising Canadians to be prepared. I am calling on the federal government to take leadership on this issue and work with the provinces and territories on pandemic preparedness. Ottawa needs to offer financial assistance to provinces and territories to help purchase vaccines and ensure readiness. As well, it is possible that the H1N1 virus could have a significant impact on the economy due to losses in productivity. In Nova Scotia, I am pleased to see that the province is acting on the recommendations made by Nova Scotia's Auditor General on flu pandemic preparedness. In July, Auditor General Jacques Lapointe sounded the alarm that the province and its health authorities were not prepared for a possible flu pandemic.

Changes to your Guaranteed Income Supplement Payments

The Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) is a federal program that provides additional money, on top of the Old Age Security pension, to seniors living in Canada who have a low income. To be eligible for the Supplement, you must be receiving the Old Age Security pension and meet defined low-income requirements.

In July, I received several calls from seniors who were concerned that their GIS payments had decreased. The Guaranteed Income Supplement is based on your previous year's income, or the combined annual income of both you and your spouse. If your annual income increased last year by any amount (such as earnings from investments) then your GIS payments will decrease. Alternatively, if your annual income decreased, than your GIS payments will increase. Please contact me if you have any concerns with your payment rate.

National Memorial for Fallen Firefighters

I am pleased that the federal government has announced funding to create a national memorial to honour fallen firefighters. This was an initiative of my colleague Peter Julian. In 2005, Julian received unanimous approval in the
