Town Hall Highlighted Volunteerism

On May 13th we met for the 16th Annual Town Hall Meeting, which is not only the Annual General Meeting for the Beaver Bank Community Awareness Association, but an opportunity for the community to question their elected reps. We were fortunate to have Councillor Barry Dalrymple and Mayor Peter Kelly attend. Both were able and willing to answer questions asked during the Q & A at the end of the meeting. We also had an opportunity to socialize with our neighbours, while enjoying refreshments. Our theme this year was to recognize our volunteer groups. Chair Victor Cobb gave us an overview of our many very active groups. New Chief Tim Keddy reporting for the Fire Department, Florence Margeson for the 55+ Keeners and Tom Margeson for the Community Centre gave their own updates. Please read in this issue about the Business/Group Directory for the identity all of the Volunteer Groups.

First I would like to mention that due to an oversight on my part, the Treasurer's Report for 2009 was not published in the last Bulletin, it is published in this edition. One major change for the past year in our accounting was how we handle money for our sub-committees. Banking regulations have changed and we are no longer allowed to accept cheques made out to a third party, for example the Skate Park. We therefore were required to set up separate accounts for each committee whose money we oversee, although the BBKAA still retains signing authority. So you now see in the Treasurer's Report four separate accounts at the end of 2009.

We would like to thank, first of all, Councillor Dalrymple and Mayor Kelly for attending. We were sorry to hear that MP Stoffer was held up in Ottawa, and we hope to see MLA Paris next year, he had other commitments this time. Thank you to our Community Policing RCMP Officer Mike Bracken for his report on crime and for having a table of

information available. The Scouts, the Fire Department, the Lions Club and the Keeners also had tables with information. Thank you to Tim Horton's, Beaver Bank Rd, for providing the coffee free of charge. Thank you to Carolyn Pitts for doing up and selling tickets on a basket; the winner was Lisa Blackburn. Thank you to those who provided door prizes, HRM Fire and Steele Ford. A very big thank you to Carolyn Pitts for arranging for the food and the many community members who donated the sandwiches, sweets and drinks.

We had two new Board Members join the BBKAA this year. We welcome Emily Lowe and Denise Crowell. We would also like to thank Karin Harrison, who has just decided to step down due to other commitments, for her several years with us. We would also like to thank Tammy Crawford who stepped down this spring, but will continue to update our website. Our returning Members are Victor Cobb, Brian Pitts, Allen Clay, Alison Crawford, Felicia Romans, Rae Marlborough, Bob Crosby, Arthur Mitchell, Marina Johnson, Kim Pitts and myself, Dorothy Selig.

There were two presentations made just before the Q & A. The Lions Club presented The Friends of Ivy Meadows with a cheque for \$3000 towards their new bus. Harmony Connection presented the BBKCC Fundraising Committee with a cheque for \$1700, money which was raised at a recent concert.

These are some of the issues that arose during question & answer, a full list will appear in the official minutes, which will be posted on the website. Robin Barrett brought up the issue of ill-tended campfires in our surrounding woodlands. Although he did say that it was not only youth who have been found to be responsible, he mentioned the value of the Scouts for teaching youth proper fire practices. He also had a good story about tracking down some illegal

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Tim Keddy New Chief of BBKVFD

For the months of March and April your Fire Dept. has responded to 38 calls. They consisted of: 1 alarm activation, 1 vehicle fire, 1 chimney fire, 2 Mutual aid structure fires, 2 brush fires, 3 illegal burns, 3 MVA's and 25 medical assists. This brings our total for the year to 60. This is again beginning to look like a busy year ahead.

We are hoping the weather won't make this a busy year for brush fires. You can help us out by burning safely. Please make sure you get a burning permit, they are available at the station on Tuesday nights between 7-8 pm. Also there have been a lot of problems in other areas with people burning on windy days. A lot of the almost 200 brush/grass fires we (HRM Fire) have had, as of the end of April, have been from people burning on windy days and the fire getting away from them. We in Beaver Bank live basically in the woods. Most of our homes are surrounded by woods. We have seen what fire can do to a subdivision in the last two years with the two major forest fires we have battled. I think a person would have a hard time sleeping at night knowing they were the reason why someone doesn't have a house to go home to. Please burn safely.

In closing I would like to inform the community that because of the position I presently hold with HRM Fire I must step down as Chief of the Beaver Bank-Kinsac Vol. Fire Dept. It has been very rewarding serving this community as Chief. I have had the pleasure of meeting and working with a lot of great people. I will still be as active as my job will allow me to be in this Great Fire Department. It has been a love of mine for over 30 years and will be for many more.

Your new Chief Tim Keddy officially took over on May 4th. Tim has been acting in the position for some time now and I wish him well in the position. I would just like to publicly Thank all those people in the department and the community who have supported me as chief over the years. And a special Thanks to my wife and children for putting up with those times I wasn't there because of the many meetings etc. that go with the job. Have a Great Summer!

Projects, Plans & Events

I would like to start this column by sharing with all of you what a wonderful group of communities we have here in District 2. The past month or so has included Volunteer Week and I was fortunate enough to attend the HRM's Volunteer Recognition Night as a member of that Committee, the Provincial Volunteers Award Dinner and the District 2 Volunteer Awards Dinner, which this year was held at the Waverley Legion. Volunteers from this area who were recognized at the HRM's Ceremony included Bill Horne (Wellington), Fred Gallop (Beaver Bank), Sandra Carr (Fall River), Julie Vials (In Memory - Windsor Jct), Abigail Fletcher (Wellington) and the entire Beaver Bank Kinsac Community Centre Board, congratulations to all of you. Almost 30 Volunteers were recognized at the District 2 Awards Dinner and their names have been in the Laker & D2news so I won't try to list them all here but certainly wish to thank and congratulate all of you and this years Volunteer of the Year, R.J. (Bob) McDonald of Waverley for his many years of service to our community. I also want to thank the Volunteer Board members of the District 2 Committee that raise the funds, organize the event and put on the special evening to honour our volunteers, there is no question it is all of you that make our communities very special.

Tenders for the design of the new Beaver Bank Kinsac Community Centre have gone out and the winning bid is in the process of being accepted. Tenders for the installation of the water system in Monarch/Rivendale subdivisions has also gone out and closes by the end of May

putting us in line for a Summer project. We have also received some extremely hopeful news on this water project, I promised you that we would not give up looking for funding partners and we have not. The Halifax Water Board have accepted our funding request and have submitted an approval request to the URB Board to fund up to 8% or about \$450,000.00. I stress that this is not a final approval but we are very hopeful this will be accepted; we continue to look for other funding partners.

Throughout April the HRM's Boundary Review Committee has been meeting, I applied for and joined that Committee as I feel the future size of Council and to our Boundary lines is crucial to the future of this District. Under current projections, by 2012 this District will be the 2nd highest populated District in the HRM and the 2nd largest in overall size - in fact 4 of the 5 largest Districts are the suburban/rural ones out here. You have told me loud & clear that Rural Districts of 21,000 people is not equal and fair representation to Urban ones of 14,000 and after attending all of the Public Meetings and from reading submissions and talking to residents I now fully support a slightly smaller Council with a couple of urban Districts being eliminated and I will endorse that idea at future Committee meetings.

I would ask that any community group, subdivision organization etc that would like to do an area clean up next spring, please contact me two months in advance. We will arrange through

Clean Nova Scotia to get you garbage bags, gloves and special garbage pick up and I have offers of businesses and local halls that will help supply food and areas for a barbecue to go with it - lets all keep our community clean!!

We brought May in with style; Mayor Peter Kelly and I attended the Friends of Ivy Meadows Annual Desert and Fashion Show, which was a complete sell out. The event was a huge success due to a great effort by the organizers and workers and on top of the funds raised from the event the Mayor & I presented them with a cheque for over \$4,400.00 towards the purchase of a new bus for the Seniors of Ivy Meadows. That same evening the Harmony Connection performed at the St John Vianney Church in Sackville, also to a sold out audience and did their magic by bringing us music from the 50's and 60's, they were kind enough to donate all proceeds to the building of the Beaver Bank Kinsac Community Centre.

I also attended our HRM Planning offices with members of the Beaver Bank Kinsac Lions Club and started the Development Agreement process of expanding their clubhouse, which is greatly needed. Just one example of the terrific work they do in our area was last week at the Beaver Bank Town Hall meeting they presented a cheque for \$3,000.00 to the Friends of Ivy Meadows towards their new bus, funds were raised from the recent Road Toll.

There are so many exciting projects and events in the works all over the District; some quick updates are as follows: Delaney Park, Beaver Bank - design of the park & playground is being done and equipment is ordered, for this summer's construction.

Beaver Bank Ballfields - design of the new bike park is done and material is ordered, construction to start ASAP. New equipment is ordered for the SkateBoard Park and installation to be done as soon as it arrives.

Playground for Beaver Bank Monarch Elementary School - funding plans almost complete and hoping for fall construction.

Multi use Outdoor Facility at HT Barrett - fundraising and HRM funding being put into place, hoping for summer of 2011 construction.

I do ask that for the next couple of weeks that more than ever you direct calls for HRM services (potholes, parks etc) to the HRM Service Line # 490-4000, it is open from 7 am to 11 pm 7 days a week.

campsites with the RCMP and stumbling upon an "herb garden". Sidewalks were another topic, Barry Dalrymple said that the intension is to eventually connect the sidewalks, but the extension set for this year to Meadow Drive will be it for a while. There are currently other areas in District 2 on the sidewalk wait list, which will take priority over more extensions for the Beaver Bank Rd. Ron Moakler asked about a recently announced charge to everyone for water upgrades downtown. Mayor Kelly explained that the charge is a result of upgrades mandated by the Federal Government, but in fact it was not just downtown areas, the whole system will be upgraded. The charge will be applied to those on city water only, not everyone in HRM. Charles Beaver, the Pharmacist owner of our new Beaver Bank Pharmacy introduced himself and explained that he is trying to attract a doctor (or two) on a permanent basis to be located in the space next door. He asked for a show of hands to see who might be interested in a local doctor and got a response from approximately half of the 100 people in attendance.

Finally we would like to thank Principal Jamie Moore of Harold T Barrett Jr High for hosting our meeting. Your help is greatly appreciated.

## A Few Words From Parliament Hill

### Cuts to the Navy Disappointing

In mid May, news broke that budgetary shortfalls were forcing the Navy to take three coastal patrol vessels at CFB Halifax and three vessels based at CFB Esquimalt out of service. Rear Admiral McFadden, Commander of Canada's Navy, had written a letter in April to navy officials on the East and West Coast, officials with DND, and the Chief of Defense Staff, outlining the plans to reduce the number of vessels in service. I was very concerned that a shortage of operating funds had forced the Navy to reduce their coastal patrol vessels on the East and West Coast. I issued a press release asking the Defense Minister to review this decision. This decision would impact both Halifax and Victoria's local economy and diminish the coastal patrol capabilities and surveillance of our waters. Many sailors and their families would be also affected by this decision. Surprisingly, less than 24 hours later, Minister MacKay denied that the decision was finalized and Chief of Defense Staff, General Walter Natynczyk, ordered that these cuts be rescinded. Although I am very pleased with this turnaround, we will be watching this situation very carefully and awaiting the federal government's national shipbuilding policy.

### New Rules for MP Public Spending Announcements and Mailings

The Ethics Commissioner recently reported that the use of partisan or personal names on ceremonial cheques for federal funding announcements goes too far. She suggests that this practice has the "potential to diminish public confidence in the integrity of Members and the governing institutions they represent." It gives the impression that the money comes from these members or the political party they belonged to, rather than from public funds. I am pleased that the Ethics Commissioner has ruled on this matter as I felt it violated the Conflict of Interest Code for Members of the House of Commons. Several MPs, including myself, made requests to the Ethics Commissioner for an investigation into these practices.

I am also pleased that the House of Commons has curtailed the use of 'out of riding' mailings by Members of Parliament. MPs were mailing pamphlets, called 10%, into ridings that they did not represent, often with very partisan messages. The Speaker has determined that MPs can no longer mail these

pamphlets to other ridings as a result of an investigation into the misuse of these mailings. I had filed a complaint to the Speaker, along with my colleague Irwin Cotler, after several inappropriate and misleading pamphlets were mailed into our ridings. This change in mailing rules will save approximately \$5-8 million of taxpayers' money per year.

### Status of Bill C-201

Unfortunately Bill C-201 was recently killed at the third reading. This bill aimed to eliminate the annuity deduction (clawback) from Canadian Forces and RCMP service and disability pensions. While the bill is defeated for now, I plan to reintroduce this bill in the next Parliament and will continue to press the government to fix this injustice. This would help alleviate the financial pressure on many disabled and retired CF and RCMP veterans. Thank you to everyone who worked so hard to move this bill forward, especially John Labelle, Roger Boutin, and Mel Pittman. These three individuals, who live in Sackville, gained the support of thousands of people across the country.

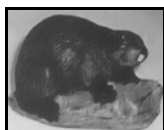
