# **Popular Beaver Bank Gas Stop Closes**

The Beaver Bank Wilson's Gas and Kwik Way, previously called Hartlen's Esso, was a convenient and friendly business where local residents could pop in to pick up a few staples for the cupboard, fill up on gas or furnace oil, share local news and even get a haircut!

The closure is deemed a devastating loss for

the community.

# **Update from Station 48 – It Has Been a Busy Summer**

Summer is slowly winding down as we move into September; students have returned to school and cooler days are ahead.

Over the summer the fire department has been busy responding to calls and keeping up our training. Since the last update we have responded to 31 pages for assistance; 16 medical assists, 8 illegal burns, 4 motor vehicle accidents, 2 structure fires and 1 brush fire. This brings our total to 88 calls so far this year. Medical assists made up over half of the calls followed by reported illegal burns running a close second for this period.

With September upon us, we would like to take some time to share some tips and pass along some friendly reminders to help everyone so that we don't have to stop by and pay you a visit. With the very dry summer and lack of rain, at times the risk of forest fires was very high to extreme. This meant there were many times that burning was banned which included campfires. As the rules for the burning season are still in effect, please check online daily to see if you can or cannot burn. Your fire department would like to thank everyone for abiding by the issued burn bans and ask that everyone continue to burn responsibly when permitted.

Even though hurricane season started in June and runs until November, September is also the time we start to have a higher chance of wild weather visiting.

Being prepared for hurricanes and tropical storms which could come our way is always a good practice to get in to. Having an emergency kit that can support you and your family for 72 hours without outside assistance is recommended. You can visit www.halifax.ca/emo and check out the links that will provide guidance on being prepared for wildfires, hurricanes, or floods. For those who have generators, check your equipment out, familiarize yourself with the operation and safety features, and make sure it is ready to go. As an added precaution, only run generators outside to prevent dangerous fumes from building up inside your home or garage. An ounce of prevention and preparation now may be key if a real emergency arises.

As we travel around the community coming back from calls or while out on training, we always keep an eye out to see if there are areas where civic signs are not easily seen from the road. We always ask "Would first responders be able to locate you quickly in an emergency?" We encourage homeowners to take a few minutes and check to see if your civic sign

can be easily seen day or night from the road. Over time, vegetation, construction or small changes may affect the ability to see these signs which could lead to a loss of precious moments for first responders getting the required help to you in an emergency. If you require a civic sign, the fire department can help you out. Visit the fire station on a Tuesday night from 7 PM to 8 PM and we will gear you up for a small nominal cost of \$15.00.

These are some friendly tips and reminders for all our residents as 2016 moves along. On behalf of the volunteers that make up your fire department, I want to thank the community we serve for supporting your local fire department and its members; together our community grows stronger.

With different emergency situations like the train derailments recently in New Brunswick and Quebec carrying very volatile petroleum products, the weather related ice/snow/power related events happening more and more, are we prepared for the worse?

**EVACUATION** from our homes with less than 10 minutes notice!!!

This is why Riverlake & District (Old name - District 2 ) Joint Emergency Management Team (JEM's) is working hard with HRM Emergency Management Operations (EMO) to develop, plan, organize and prepare to respond quickly to a wide range of emergency events. These events could include flooding, forest fires, plane/train/highway disasters, water disasters or any other catastrophic event.

The JEM's team is trying to be pro-active with monthly meetings, preparing communities for disastrous incidents by establishing Comfort Centers, Community Status Reporters (CSR's), planning and public education on how to prepare for a major incident. We work closely with police, fire, EMO and many of the other JEM's across HRM. With this in mind we need plans in place to implement in the event of a catastrophic incident. The where do we go? What do we do?, Where do we stay? Questions will have answers. JEM's would be a focal point if there was a serious incident within the

communities.

The team is hoping that more awareness to JEM's will help increase the number of volunteers willing to participate. We are actively looking for people from our communities of Beaver Bank, Fall River, Grand Lake/Oakfield, Lake Fletcher. Lakeview, Waverley, Wellington and Goff's area who wish to get involved in some positions such as Community Status Reporters who are not required to leave their homes if something happens, just call in and report what the conditions are like in their area. If people are interested in joining and

participating with the interest of their community in mind, the meetings are held at Fire Station 45 in Fall River every month on the 1st Thursday at 7pm except July, August & December.

# Routine Results Available Online - Federal and Provincial Governments Launch MyHealthNS to Improve Health Care in Nova Scotia

Doctors and patients in Nova Scotia can now get routine test results and share information through MyHealthNS, a new secure online tool.

Patients of participating physicians receiving results from the QEII Health Sciences Centre, the IWK Health Centre or other facilities in the Halifax, Eastern Shore and West Hants areas will now be able to access this information on their smartphone or other web-enabled devices.

The system will be expanded to all other parts of the province by early 2017, making Nova Scotia the first province in Canada to offer a digital health service option province wide.

MyHealthNS will allow patients to receive, view and manage their personal health information electronically, making it more convenient, and in some cases saving them a visit to the clinic to get information like normal test results. It will also mean more

appointments available to be booked for those who need to see a doctor in person.

# Apply Now For Antlerless Deer Hunting Stamps

Now is the time for Nova Scotia hunters to apply for antlerless deer hunting stamps for this fall's hunting season. There are 6,200 stamps available.

Qualified hunters can apply online, using a credit card for the \$8.04 fee. at:

http://novascotia.ca/natr/draws/dee rdraw/. They may also apply by calling 1-900-565-3337 and the fee will be billed directly to the landline phone. Applications will be taken until Aug. 31 at midnight.

The stamp is applied to a deer hunting licence to provide the legal permission to hunt antlerless deer. Controlling the number of does is a major part of sustainably managing the deer population in Nova Scotia. This year, hunters may harvest one deer of either sex with just a regular hunting licence in zone 107. A limited number of antlerless stamps are available in zones 101,102,103, 104,105,106,108 and 109. None are available in zones 110,111 and 112.

Applicants are encouraged to know the deer management zone boundaries before they apply. Zone information is at <a href="http://novascotia.ca/natr/draws/deerdraw/ddZones.asp">http://novascotia.ca/natr/draws/deerdraw/ddZones.asp</a>. The number of stamps available, by deer management zone, is at


