

New Councillor for District 14



Lisa Blackburn wins municipal election for District 14.

On October 15th, District 14 voters elected a new municipal councillor – Lisa Blackburn of Beaver Bank. It was a very close race but Lisa managed to eke out the victory by a margin of 47 votes.

Lisa has lived in Beaver Bank for over 35 years. She has a Bachelor's degree in Journalism and has worked in radio, television and newspaper as well as new media.

On her Facebook page Lisa thanked her opponents for a "solid and strong campaign". She commended Brad Johns for his work within the community and stated that she was looking forward with working Kevin Copley in the future on matters of planning and development. Lisa also thanked her family and volunteers of her campaign. She stated "to the voters of District 14. This is the end of the job interview and I am looking forward to going to work for you".

Interestingly 4829 out of a possible 16195 votes

were cast in District 14 municipal for the election. This accounted for only 29.82% rate participation despite the several different methods available for casting a vote.

Regardless of the number of votes cast, the winner was clear. Congratulations to Lisa Blackburn. We look forward to what the future has in store for us.

Update from Station 48 Cooler Weather is Here, Old Man Winter is Not That Far Away



Greetings on behalf of the volunteers of the Beaver Bank –Kinsac Volunteer Fire Department. Your fire department continues to keep busy with training, responding to calls, and most recently visiting our local schools for Fire Prevention Week activities.

Since the last update we have responded to 37 pages for assistance: 21 medical assists. 6 alarms activated, 4 structure fires, 2 calls of trees on power lines, 1 motor vehicle accident, 1 illegal burn, 1 carbon monoxide detection and 1 smoke investigation. This brings our total to 125 calls so far this year which is an increase in the number of calls we usually have for this time in the year. Pages for medical assists made up the bulk of the responses for the late summer as we move into fall.

There are a couple of upcoming community events that your fire department will be participating in over the next little while which include the Remembrance Day service at the cenotaph next to the fire station and the Annual Parade of Lights. We hope you can make it out for these important community events.

Your fire department would like to thank everyone for burning responsibly this past summer and even though the official burn season is over according to the Department of Natural Resources; under the HRM Open Air Burning By-Law, homeowners must still adhere to the intent of the rules and follow the local by-laws. If unsure if you can or cannot burn, please visit the fire station on a Tuesday night between 7PM and 8 PM and we will be happy to answer your questions.

Even though hurricane season started in June and runs until November, the chance of wild weather visiting our region is higher this time of year. As we recently experienced in Atlantic Canada with the flooding in Cape Breton and parts of Newfoundland, you can never be too prepared for hurricanes, tropical storms, or even a good old Nor'easter which could come our way. It is always a good practice to have an emergency kit that can support you and your family for 72 hours without outside assistance. Being prepared before an event occurs is a good practice and you are ready if a real emergency arises.

With the cooler weather approaching, your friendly neighborhood firefighters would like to pass along some tips to keep you and your family safe as me move closer to winter and when the snow begins to fly.

Many of our residents have chimneys and wood burning appliances that heat our homes when the temperature begins to dip down. Before you fire up the woodstove for the first time, check your woodstove, or your furnace, and the chimney. Make sure all is in order with the wood burning device and the chimney is clean and ready to go. If you discover any issues and need it checked, call your local service technician. If you are a person who burns wood to keep your home warm, burn only seasoned firewood as it burns better and cleaner. Most chimney fires can prevented if the wood burning device is well kept, and the chimney kept clean.

With the cooler temperatures, black ice and eventually snow covered roads won't be long appearing. Please drive the for the road conditions. Build in a little extra time to get to your destination as road conditions can change quickly with the oncoming cold weather. Keep your car windows clear of ice and snow (including the vehicle roof in case you have to brake suddenly), the windshield washer fluid topped up and if you haven't thought about it yet, maybe throw on the winter tires sooner rather than later. Don't be caught unprepared for when the first snowfall makes its grand entrance.

These are some friendly tips and reminders for all our residents as 2016 moves along. On behalf of the volunteers that make up your fire department, I want to thank the community we serve for supporting your local fire department and its members; together our community grows stronger.

Easier Access to Heating Assistance Rebates

Government is making changes to the Heating Assistance Rebate Program that will make it easier and faster for Nova Scotians to apply for and receive their rebate.

The 2016-17 program will begin accepting applications on Monday, Oct. 31 and feature a new online application system and direct deposit option. Eligible applicants can receive up to a \$200 rebate for heating assistance.

"We know some Nova Scotians struggle with the cost of heating their homes during the cold winter months," says Service Nova Scotia Minister Mark Furey. "Nova Scotians expect and want more government services to be available online and with this announcement we're doing just that."

The new online system will allow Nova Scotians to apply for the rebate online, and will allow both those who apply online and by paper form to check the status of their application online in real time. Before now, applicants had to call Service Nova Scotia to ask for an update on their application. Those registered for direct deposit with Canada Revenue Agency can also receive their rebate directly to their bank account.

Paper applications will still be

available at Access Nova Scotia locations, Community Services' and MLA offices, or through more than 70 community groups and other locations across the province, and for print online.

"Last year, the program helped more than 42,600 citizens and families in the province stay warm during the cold winter months," said Mr. Furey. "It's my hope that we reach every Nova Scotian who can benefit from this program."

Beginning in 2017, the Heating Assistance Rebate Program will move to a fixed launch date.

Progress in Education - Update

Education has been a priority for this Government. In 2013, we ran on a platform to reinvest the \$65 million that was cut from our classroom by the NDP government. We have done exactly that, increasing the Education budget each year.

Education Investments Overall

 Government reinvesting \$65m to support 117 actions to improve student learning in the classroom

More Teachers and More professionals Supporting Teachers and Students

- 532 more teachers were hired in the first 3 years because of government reinvestment
- 114 reading recovery teachers (57 FTEs)
- Continued investment of \$1.5 million in the Special Needs Support Grant for children with complex needs
- Continued student support grant funding of \$2.1 million: \$5,000 per school, plus \$1.00 per student

Smaller Classes

 \$22.6 million to reduce class sizes in elementary (primary to grade six)

Math and Literacy

 Government invested \$17.5 million in math and literacy (math early interventionists, math and literacy mentors, reading recovery teachers, and literacy leads)

Teacher Advice and Involvement

Teachers were involved in the streamlining of the grade 4 to 6 curriculum. These teachers codeveloped and facilitated the professional learning of the curriculum for all grades 4-6 teachers in the province

- Teachers and administrators contributed to the development of provincial teachers standards
- Teachers participated in a focus group on teacher preparedness as they leave their practicum and enter the classroom
- Consultation on the provincial student attendance policy included teachers and administrators who responded to an online survey, and who participated in online focus groups
- Teachers and administrators are being provided with ongoing professional development to support action plan priorities
