### **Update from Station 48 Happy New Year**

Happy New Year from the members of the Beaver Bank – Kinsac Volunteer Fire Department, proudly serving our community for over 53 years. On behalf of the members, I would like to thank the community for your support in 2018 and we wish everyone a safe and prosperous 2019.

Your fire department continues to be busy training and responding to calls within our community. Since the last update, we have responded to 28 calls; 16 medical assists, 4 mutual aid structure fires, 4 alarms activated, 2 motor vehicle accidents, 1 carbon monoxide alarm, and 1 power pole/tree on fire. We ended 2018 with a grand total of 183 page outs for assistance which is a significant increase from previous years. In addition, we already have responded to 6 incidents since we rang in the new year for 2019.

As mentioned in the last bulletin, the members of the fire department had started the "Fill a Porta-Tank" campaign to raise food donations for Beacon House for the holiday season. The members of the fire department would like to thank everyone for their generous support. In our first year for this particular event, we raised approximately 700 pounds of food and approximately \$500 in cash donations. The Beaver Bank - Kinsac Awareness Association matched the dollar

donations for a grand total of 700 lbs of food and \$1000 for Beacon House. Thank you for all those who donated. A special shout out to the Beaver Bank -Kinsac Community Center, Beaver Bank - Kinsac Awareness Association. and the volunteer firefighters at Station 45 (Fall River) for an extra helping hand in our inaugural drive. We look forward to next year to build on this year's success.

With Winter finally here, here are a few safety tips from your friendly neighborhood firefighters that will hopefully help prevent a call for us to visit your home.

Driving Habits - Our road conditions continue to change quickly with the changing winter weather. Black ice, snow covered roads, sudden temperature drops, and darkness during the morning and evening commute are just some of the surprises that Mother Nature and Old Man Winter like to throw our way. Some suggestions when hitting the road are the use of appropriate winter tires, a roadside emergency kit, a blanket, and a good snowbrush to keep your windshield and windows clear of that dirty ice and snow. The main tip is to drive for the conditions showing, slow and steady will always get you safely home. If you don't have to be on the roads, then relax at home.

Ice Safety - With the cold temperatures the last little bit, many of the local ponds have frozen over and turned to ice covered playgrounds for everyone. Before you venture out on the ice, have a responsible person check the thickness of the ice. Some of our ponds in the area (Barrett Lake & Tucker Lake) have the ice thickness measured by HRM. You can check out the HRM website for these Ice Thickness Reports and safety notes about activities on frozen ponds and lakes. As a general guide - a person skating alone on ice requires 15 cm of ice thickness. For a skating party or group – 20 cm. For a snowmobile or ATV - 25 cm of ice thickness is recommended.

Adopt A Hydrant – For our residents who have a fire hydrant near their property, the fire department would like you to "adopt" the hydrant this winter. If you



have the time and opportunity, why not keep it clear of ice and snow. This not only helps the fire department in protecting your home in the event we are called there, but the

homes of your fellow neighbors.

These are some friendly tips and reminders for all our residents as 2019 moves along. On behalf of the volunteers that make up your fire department, I want to thank the community we serve for supporting your

local fire department and its members; together our community grows stronger. Until next time – stay and play safe.

### **Bill's Blog**

Since 2015, on the third Monday of February, Nova Scotians have marked Heritage Day. On Monday, February 18<sup>th</sup>, Nova Scotians will celebrate this year's honouree, Maud Lewis. Maud's story is one of overcoming challenges to enjoy the simple pleasures of life. She came to national fame late in life, a few short years before her death in 1970.

# **Expanded Dental Care for Young Nova Scotians**

The Province of Nova Scotia is expanding dental coverage for young Nova Scotians through the Children's Oral Health Program. All children ages 14 and younger will now be eligible for molar sealants and an annual fluoride treatment. Children at high risk for developing cavities will be eligible for a second annual fluoride treatment. Previously, only children with cavities were eligible for an annual fluoride treatment and only those with deep molar grooves were eligible for sealants.

The expanded services are part of an agreement between the province and the Nova Scotia Dental Association, which is retroactive to April 1, 2018. The new agreement also increases the fees dentists earn on Nova Scotia's MSI dental programs, including the Children's Oral Health Program, by 5%.

The Children's Oral Health Program is a universal program that covers basic dental care. Children with private insurance coverage use that first, before government coverage is accessed. Last year, more than 56,000 children accessed the program.

# Minimum Wage to Increase

Nova Scotia's minimum wage rate will rise to \$11.55 on April. The Province of Nova Scotia accepted the recommendations of the Minimum Wage Review Committee to increase the rate and update the calculation to set the rate for the next three years.

The committee recommended the minimum wage increase by approximately .55 each year for the next three years. Then starting on April 1st, 2022, the rate be adjusted annually with inflation. This increase will help minimum wage earners and their families and provides businesses with a three- year outlook so they can plan.

What a busy new year it's been so far - Regional Council and North West Community Council have been addressing issues on behalf of residents such as Municipal Planning Strategy and Land Use By-Law proposed amendments; single-use plastic reduction strategy; and the ongoing discussion and planning priorities associated with the annual budget process. We are doing our very best to keep the tax rate as low as possible while still providing best quality services and programs to you.

February is a month to reflect on and celebrate our heritage as it is Black History Month and a time to celebrate Heritage Day on February 19<sup>th</sup>. This year we celebrate Maud Lewis for her inspiring folk art. February 14th is a time to acknowledge our appreciate and love for friends, family and perhaps our community as a whole. However, knowing Beaver Bank Kinsac as I do, you do not limit your appreciation to one day but acknowledge it year-round through your volunteerism. You are certainly a community that cares!

Another tradition is Groundhog Day on February 2<sup>nd</sup> – will he or won't he see his shadow? Whether Shubenacadie Sam sees his shadow or not, it is with absolute certainty that I can state that spring will arrive six weeks from February 2<sup>nd</sup>! The following are highlights from the recent North West Community Council meetings and Regional Council sessions. Recent activity at the North West Community Council

## includes: Fall River

#### Case 20594: SPS Amendment Fall River Opportunity Site B

The proposed development is for an enriched living care facility intended to respond to market demand for housing that is designed to meet the changing needs of citizens as they age. The proposal includes multiunit dwellings building forms augmented by a range of on-site services including, foot care, general health counselling and support, transportation and housekeeping provided through a contract with Northwoodcare Inc.

The applicant is proposing amendments to the density and form limitations in Policy RL-13 to allow additional units and larger buildings to generate

economies of scale that would enable the care services by Northwoodcare Inc. as well as additional building enhancements such as underground parking, elevators, and common spaces. The higher density is also requested to minimize the cost of the rental units to increase affordability.

The details of the request for MPS amendments are as follows:

- a) increase the permitted density from 4 units per acre to 8:
- b) increase the maximum number of storeys per building from 3 storeys to 4; c) increase in the maximum number of units per multiple unit building from 40 units to 100; and
- d) include two smaller sites identified as PIDs 40707432 and 40707440 as a part of Residential Opportunity Site B to allow these sites to be used for access to the proposed development.

#### **Beaver Bank**

Case 20757: Development Agreement for 235 Beaver Bank Road, Beaver Bank HRM has received an application from T.A. Scott Architecture & Design Ltd. to enter into a development agreement with the municipality to permit a new commercial building at 235 Beaver Bank Rd featuring a pharmacy and medical clinic uses.

The property is designated Urban Residential [UR]

under the **Sackville** Municipal Planning Strategy [MPS], and is currently zoned R-6. The proposal is being considered under MPS policies UR-15 and UR-18. Policy UR-15 enables Community Council to consider applications for Medical Clinics in the UR Designation by **Development Agreement** while Policy UR-18 enables consideration of local commercial or C-1 uses in the UR Designation by development agreement.

**BEAVER BANK TRANSIT** 

Regional Council approved the Transportation Standing Committee's recommendation to have staff continue with the implementation of Route 89 and Route 189 as approved in Halifax Transit's Moving Forward Together Plan. The staff report before Regional Council explained that only 11% of current boardings occur on that portion of the route north of Beaver Bank Kinsac Community Centre, despite this portion representing approximately 40% of the distance travelled on the route. This represents an average of 24 boardings per weekday at stops north of Beaver Bank Kinsac Community Centre. An average of 4 boardings per weekday were made at Ivy Meadows Continuing Care Community and an average of 20 boardings per weekday were made at stops between lvy Meadows and Beaver Bank Kinsac Community Centre.

Please read the October 10, 2018 staff report on the December 13, 2018 Transportation Standing Committee agenda for full details on the options presented and rationale leading to the recommendation.

#### Regional

Cogswell District Redevelopment ProjectSome major projects underway regionally include 1. the Cogswell District redevelopment project. The Cogswell District is one of the biggest city-building projects in the history of Halifax. A new neighbourhood will soon be  $^{2}$ . built - where the Cogswell Interchange now stands designed to connect downtown with the north end and waterfront, creating a stronger, more inclusive network of communities. The following image is the concept plan for the area:

Single Use Plastic Reduction Strategy Discussions have been held on a Single-Use Plastic Reduction Strategy leading to the following amended motion approved by Regional Council on Tuesday, January 15th:

- 1. Initiate an education campaign for residents and the ICI sector focused on the reduction of single-use plastics;
- 2. Review and update the 2009 HRM Corporate Guidelines for Greening Meetings and Catering Requirements; and
- 3. Collaborate with the ten largest NS municipalities and develop, in accordance with AO 2017-002-ADM. respecting the Charter of Governing Principles for Regulation, a By-law for Council's consideration as soon as possible but no later than December 2019, to eliminate the distribution of single-use plastic bags without first attempting a voluntary approach.


