

25 Years of memories unveiled July 1

Canada Day in Beaver Bank drew huge crowds this year! A big attraction was the unveiling of the Time Capsule buried in 1992. The capsule was buried by Frank Davis who also dug up the capsule on July 1 2017. Frank was also able to rebury a new capsule in Sept 2017 which included lots of submissions from the community to once again enjoy in 25 years!

Canada Day festivities also included a free pancake breakfast, flag raising, family fair and a beer fest! Thank you to all the hardworking volunteers who make this event possible every year!

Update from Station 48 - Where did summer go?

Since the last edition of the bulletin, the fire department has responded to 53 pages for assistance; 28 medical assists, 12 alarm activations, 2 structure fires (mutual aid), 2 illegal burns, 2 motor vehicle accidents, 2 special service calls, 1 CO detector activation, 2 investigation calls, and 2 power line down/ power lines arcing calls. This brings our total number of call outs for the year to 107.

On Canada Day, as part of the Canada 150 celebrations in our community, we participated in the opening of the time capsule that was located in the cenotaph next to the fire station. It was a wonderful time getting to meet everyone and see what items had been stored there for the last 25 years, even if the weather did not exactly cooperate. The time capsule will be re-filled with new items from the community and resealed to be opened in 25 years for the celebration of Canada 175.

The Beaver Bank – Kinsac Volunteer Fire Department continues to keep busy with training and responding to emergencies within our beautiful community. Fire Prevention Week (October 8th to October 14th) is quickly coming up in early October and the members of the fire department will be out in the community visiting local schools and organisations to spread the

word on fire prevention. The theme this year is "Every Second Counts - Have 2 Ways Out". We recommend that all homes have a dedicated escape plan and a meeting place in the event of a fire emergency in your home. This time of year is a good time to practice this plan with the family to make sure evervone knows what to do, where to meet, and that the plan actually works in the event a fire should occur.

Your fire department would like to thank everyone for continuing to burn responsibly. The images and videos from the recent news reports from British Columbia of the destruction caused by the numerous wildfires is a constant reminder that it can also happen here in Nova Scotia. Even though it is a distant memory now, large wildfires such the Porters Lake forest fire in June 2008 and the wildfire in the Spryfield/Sambro area in April 2009 are a sober reminder that it can and has happened in the HRM. Even though DNR may end the official burning season on October 15th - it is important to know that the municipal HRM Open Air Bylaw remains in effect for the entire year and the basic rules about burning still apply.

As a quick reminder, if you live on a street serviced with both municipal water and sewer service, there is

no domestic brush burning permitted. It is important for those who are allowed to burn in HRM to know that there is no burning from midnight until 2 PM. Under extreme conditions at any time. DNR or the municipality can implement a ban on burning. If you are unsure if you can or cannot burn, please visit the fire station on a Tuesday night between 7PM and 8 PM and we will be happy to answer your questions. You can also check out https://www.halifax.ca/firepolice/fire and click the "Burning Rule & Regulations" for more information.

As we move into Fall - the evening daylight starts getting shorter and nights are cooler – at some point the old furnace or woodstove will get put back into service to take the chill out of the air at home. Before you flash up the furnace or woodstove for the first time, complete a nice thorough inspection to make sure everything is in good working order whether it is done by yourself or a certified person. For woodstoves, check the chimney and if you haven't done so since last Spring give it a good cleaning and be ready for the home heating season.

On a final note, the Beaver Bank Awareness Association is working with the fire department in order to provide free civic signs to residents in order to help first responders find you in

the time of an emergency. There are 100 civic signs available for people who request a civic sign and they will have the fee waived. I encourage

anyone who does not have a one of these high visibility civic signs to drop by and take advantage of this wonderful opportunity. On behalf of the volunteers that make up your fire department, I want to thank the community we serve for

supporting your local fire department and its members; together our community grows stronger.

21 years ago the members of the Beaver Bank Awareness Association were instrumental in inviting the RCMP to open a Community Office in Beaver Bank, manned by volunteers (16 applied at that time). In the office is a plaque acknowledging 20 vears of continual RCMP service. Unfortunately, due to policy changes, and the escalation of computerization, the tasks performed at that Office have dwindled, as has the number of volunteers (presently 6 members having a combined number


of volunteer years totalling 102).

We will still have a liaison with the RCMP but, with the sanction of both the Community Centre and the Awareness Committees, we are embarking on a new venture which we hope will serve the Community well. The following services will be offered at the newly formed Beaver Bank Community Information Hub (BBCIH) Scanning of documents for the Beaver Bank Virtual Museum and Fultz House, receiving non-perishable food items for Beacon House, managing

applications for

Civic signs, offering free Commissioner of Oaths service, scheduling MLA and Councillor visitations, periodically providing a Shredathon service (next is Sat. October 28th9am – noon), loaning Capsite GPS units as well as monitoring Keeners Library of Garden Books.

With fond summer memories fresh in our minds we head into what is sure to be a busy fall season. Just like the students heading back to school across our riding, my colleagues and I return to the House of Commons to continue our work on behalf of our constituents.

As I return to Ottawa I feel very proud to represent Sackville-Preston-Chezzetcook, especially after recognizing twenty very special constituents from our riding. On September 13th, we had a community BBQ at the Beaver Bank Kinsac Community Centre. It was wonderful to see so many familiar faces and to enjoy good food with good friends. At the barbeque we announced the winners of the Canada150 sesquicentennial pin contest. Over the past several months we have asked residents to nominate individuals or organizations across our riding, in recognition of their community involvement, specifically those who made a significant contribution to our community through the following four themes:

Diversity and Inclusion; Reconciliation of Indigenous and non-Indigenous Canadians; Environmental stewardship; and Engaging and inspiring youth. The final two themes address issues that are very important for Sackville-Preston-Chezzetcook: Seniors and Veterans.

The sesquicentennial pin is limited edition because it contains the original copper that covered the roofs of Canada's Parliament Buildings from 1918 to 1996. The pin is a memento of Canada's proud heritage and it was made in partnership with the Ottawa-Carleton Association for Persons with Developmental Disabilities.

Thank you to everyone who placed a nomination and of course to the winners. It is difficult to recognize only 20 individuals in a riding with such an abundance of volunteerism and selflessness. Every project we take on and every cause that we refuse to give up on touches the lives of so many people and I applaud you all for the essential support you provide to the people of our communities each and every day. Thank you and congratulations!

In September I also had the opportunity to participate in a "Seniors Week". By visiting the Sagewood and Millwood Place in Sackville; Ivy Meadows in Beaver Bank; and the Waverley Manor in Waverley I received excellent feedback from our seniors on the issues that affect them most. As the government

works towards establishing a National Seniors Strategy, understanding the challenges facing seniors in our riding is critical. Removal of Tuition Fees for Apprenticeship Technical Training

Nova Scotia Government will start covering the cost of tuition for apprentices returning to the classroom for their technical training this fall.

The removal of tuition. beginning with this September's classes, will save apprentices up to \$900 per year. The training is a requirement of the apprenticeship program and is needed for apprentices to progress to certification.

Apprentices typically complete a six to ten-week block of technical training after every 1,800 hours of on-the-job training, until certification. Approximately 2,200 apprentices receive technical training each year. This number is expected to

increase with the removal of tuition.

The removal of tuition for apprenticeship technical training is part of government's plan to increase youth employment and grow the workforce.

Nova Scotia's apprenticeship system prepares people for jobs in the skilled trades. The Nova Scotia Apprenticeship Agency is focused on improving the number of apprenticeship opportunities in the province and helping apprentices complete their certification.



Crisis is selfdefined by the individual calling for support.

The crisis line also supports families, friends, community agencies and others to manage mental health crisis through education, outreach and consultation.




