

Update from Station 48 – Spring is in the air & wildfire season begins

Spring Greetings to everyone on behalf of the men and women of the Beaver Bank –Kinsac Volunteer Fire Department. With the last few kicks of winter finally behind us, the members of the fire department are looking forward to warmer temperatures and nicer days ahead.

Here is a quick summary of call statistics that your fire department has responded to since the last edition of the bulletin. We have responded to 29 pages for assistance since the last update. We have responded to 19 medical assists, 2 alarm activations, 1 structure fire (mutual aid), 4 motor vehicle accidents, 1 chimney fire, 1 tree/power pole fire, and 1 CO investigation. This brings our total number of call outs for the year to 37.

Your fire department continues to keep very busy responding to emergency calls and conducting our regular training on Tuesday nights. Now that winter is behind us and the weather getting nicer, we will be spending more time out in the community training.

Your fire department would like to thank everyone for burning responsibly last summer. However, with the lack of snow in the woods over the winter and the frozen ground not able to absorb the water runoff we have a strong concern for

the risk of brush or forest fires this upcoming season. By the time this edition of the bulletin is published, we will have already started into 2018 Burning Season within the province as determined by the Department of Natural Resources. The season runs from March 15th to October 15th and so we would like to pass along a friendly reminder of the Do's & Don'ts of burning.

There are two sets of regulations with respect to open air burning, provincial regulations issued by the Department of Natural Resources; and the municipal HRM Open Air Burning By-Law.

Homeowners must adhere to the provincial rules and follow

the local by- laws. The general rule is that if you live on a



street serviced with both municipal water and sewer, you are not allowed to burn brush. If you want to have a campfire, it can only be in an approved wood burning device like a chimnea and have a spark catcher. If you are on a street that is not serviced with both municipal water and municipal sewer, you can burn brush as long as you follow the

requirements. Some of the basic requirements for burning brush include the size of the fire, the fire must be at least 75 feet from any structure or woods, a means to extinguish the fire is on hand, a responsible person is present and tending the fire, and have a means to call 911. If you have a campfire it must be kept small (around 18 inches high by 18 inches wide). All campfires must be at least 15 feet from any structure, trees, or shrubs. As per the regulations, only clean wood can be burned, no garbage, construction debris, etc. It is important for those who burn to know that in HRM there is no burning from midnight until 2 PM. At 2 PM you must check the DNR website and if it is GREEN, you can burn from 2 PM until midnight. If it is YELLOW, you can burn from 7 PM until midnight. If it is RED, no burning permitted which includes campfires. Under extreme conditions at any time, DNR or the municipality can implement a ban on burning.

If you are unsure if you can or cannot burn, please check out the following websites for more information or visit the fire station on a Tuesday night between 7PM and 8 PM and we will be happy to answer your questions.

The HRM website is very easy to use and has lots of information for residents when it comes to burning.

With the recent tragedies throughout our province with house fires as of late, the fire department would like encourage everyone to take a moment and do a quick look around their home and check their smoke detectors. Usually we recommend residents check their smoke detectors the same night as they change the time on their clocks in the Spring and



Fall. Give them a test, change the batteries if required, and check to see how old they are. After about 10 years, the smoke detector should be replaced. It is

recommended that a smoke detector be placed on each floor of the house; with one being outside of bedrooms. It is even now recommended that a smoke detector be installed in each bedroom. As well, if you have a carbon monoxide detector, don't forget to inspect it on a regular basis and change the batteries as required. The municipality of Halifax has the "Alarmed and Ready" Program if you cannot afford to buy smoke or carbon monoxide detectors for your home. Please call 311 and they will take your information and pass it to the Fire Prevention office. Firefighters will arrange a time to visit your property to install the detector and review with you the testing and operation of the unit.

advantage of this wonderful opportunity.


As always, the members of the fire department wish

During wildfire-risk season, March 15 - Oct 15, you must check before you burn brush.

Burning — Burning brush (domestic burning) is allowed between 2pm and 8am. (counties coloured green) Restricted — Burning brush is allowed only between 7pm and 8am, for safety reasons (counties coloured yellow)

No Burning — No domestic brush burning, due to high risk of wildfires (counties coloured red)

Domestic burning is not allowed between 8am and 2pm.

Please Note: Check municipal bylaws first.

Beaver Bank ATV Club

We have been having a lot of question regarding joining the club and the **Barrett Lumber Company** (BLC) Stewardship program. You are not required to have the BLC Stewardship program completed in order to join the club. HOWEVER, you DO have to complete the BLC Stewardship program to access BLC Land. We are working on getting more user-friendly maps highlighting BLC Land more clearly for riders.

IMPORTANT BARRETT OHV ACCESS INFORMATION.

All OHV groups are welcome and are encouraged to attend the OHV course. You're required to have the Barrett stewardship agreement completed, OHV plate up to date, OHV insurance, and to be a member of an ATVANS club. If you have not completed the Stewardship course requirement call (902) 252-3137 for registration and additional information. *Note: OHV operators that come to Beaver Bank as a guest can get temporary permission to operate their OHV on Barrett land. As long as the guest is accompanied by an OHV operator with a valid Barrett OHV sticker, they can register as a guest. This

cannot be used to avoid the stewardship program (gate key meetings) or OHV course and is only to be used for temporary situations.

BLC Roads Update

BLC changes the locks on their gates each spring when the DOT puts their spring weight restrictions into effect for the spring thaw. When the locks are changed there is NO motorized vehicle access to BLC lands.

A message from Darrell Samson

Dear friends, Spring is here! And while it may take the weather a bit longer to catch up, I hope that you are getting out and enjoying the longer days.

The spring also means budget season. Over the past two years, hardworking Canadians created six hundred thousand new jobs – most of them full-time. Unemployment is at 5.7% - the lowest rate in forty years. And thanks to our Canada Child Benefit, three hundred thousand fewer kids are living in poverty across Canada. This is a forty percent decrease from 2013.

In Budget 2018, I was particularly proud to see our government invest \$74 million dollars to prevent the spread of spruce budworm in Atlantic Canada, \$250 million dollars to renew our network of small craft harbours and \$100 million dollars to develop the next generation of rural broadband. I would also like to highlight investments in local community supports for youth at risk and culturally focused mental health programs in the Black Canadian community.

Our veterans will see a \$42 million dollar investment to improve service delivery capacity at Veterans Affairs Canada, an expansion of the Medical Expense Credit to recognize the cost of psychiatric service dogs

and over \$4 billion dollars to improve financial benefits for veterans. Finally, the 2018 Budget will help families in Sackville-Preston-Chezzetcook. The Canada Revenue Agency will now automatically determine eligible lowincome workers that will receive the new Canada Worker's Benefit and keep up to \$500 dollars of their paycheque. The Budget includes a \$10 million dollar investment to provide income support and training for seasonal workers who are on El. The government is also introducing a new "use it or lose it" El Paternal Sharing Benefit in June 2019. This Benefit will provide five additional weeks of paternal leave for new parents. Either parent may take up to thirty-five weeks. The other parents may take the remainder of the forty total weeks.

On International Women's Day I was happy to attend the International Women's Day Breakfast in Sackville. It was great to join female leaders in our community and celebrate women's contributions to our community, country and world. It was an opportunity to reflect on the progress we have made together to advance gender equality and the important work that still needs to be done every day of the year.

The Sackville-Preston-Chezzetcook Youth Council has been working hard to organize a town hall on mental health for this April. I was very impressed by their research and hard work as they prepare for their first event. Expert speakers include: Dr. Stan Kutcher, the Strongest Families Institute and Charlene Pickrem with Pick Empowerment. So I would like to take this opportunity to invite you all to our next town hall!

April 4th 2018, 6-8:30pm at Sackville High School (1 King Fisher Way, Lower Sackville, NS B4C 2Y9)

It will be a chance to discuss mental health access and funding with a panel of experts, so please come out and participate!

Province Expands Caregiver Benefit Program

More Nova Scotians will receive support for providing care to adults living at home through the expansion of eligibility for the Caregiver Benefit Program. Until now the program has offered \$400 a month to those who provide unpaid care for 20 or more hours per week to an adult

with very high care needs. The eligibility criteria is being expanded to include people who help care for those assessed as having high to very high care needs.


By expanding the program it can ease the financial responsibility often associated with caregiving and allow more Nova Scotians to live in their homes for as long as possible. Regulated Child Care to Expand

This program will help more families across the province by creating up to 1,000 new regulated child care spaces as part of a \$8.9-million investment. Up to 500 new child care spaces will be created in the home-based regulated child care setting. The other 500 spaces will

be part of 15 new regulated child care centres being created in communities in need of child care. A portion of this funding will be used to support a new infant incentive for child care providers across the province. This will account for \$6.9 million over the next two years.

The remaining \$2 million has been designated as a one-time grant in 2018-2019 to support existing centres to convert their space to meet the changing child care needs of their communities. In January 2018, the province signed a three-year, \$35 million early learning and child care funding agreement with the federal government. A portion of that funding has been designated to increase the number of spaces and set up the onetime grant funding.

The History of Barrett Lumber Company

The old mill on Beaver
Bank Road was first owned
by brothers Benjamin and
Tom Dean. It opened in
1875. IN 1926 Harold. T
Barrett purchased the 5acre mill site from Dean's
and Barrett Lumber
Company began. Today
and the land size is 40
acres with over 13 acres of
timberland owned by Robin
Barrett, Harold's grandson.

The first item of interest in at the mill that catches the customers eye is an oil painting of Harold T Barrett, the artist was Harold's grandson Steven Crowther, his parents are Reverend Tom and Patricia Crowther. Harold and his wife Jean (nee Umlaw) were parents of five children. They were raised in a white two-story house on the same property as the mill.

Harold and Jean's three sons, Keith, David and Hugh all work at the mill to this day. David started full time in 1955 and Hugh in 1959. Keith returned to Barrett Lumber after a career at NS Power Corporation. Even as young children, the brothers were always expected to lend a hand at the mill whenever necessary. The Barrett daughters are Patricia Crowther and Margaret Lynn Ashley.

From the 1950's to the 1990's there was a bunkhouse on the mill for employees from away and a cook in the cookhouse always had three homemade meals a day for the workers. Cousins from Mount Uniacke would visit for summer vacation and the mill pond was used for entertainment, swimming during the day and diving for deadheads. Each log they would receive \$.10 - a lot of money to a child back then!

IN 1995 the mill underwent a major upgrade. Each year a percentage if the profits went back to the business for new machinery, saws, planer and other items needed to make sure their lumber was up to standards. Safety of the employees is important at Barrett Lumber, Training is provided for the employees and proper safety equipment is always used.

It's been said that if you walk into Barrett Lumber today, with plans to build a new home or cottage or, to renovate your existing home, you will walk away with everything you need, a smile on your face and still have money in your bank account. Barrett Lumber has had few complaints over the years but a lot of thank you's from the community if Beaver Bank.

Any information will be thankfully received by his brother, Andrew O'Keeffe, 17 School St., Cambridgeport, MA"
