

Update from Station 48 – It's a brand-new decade – 2020

Welcome to 2020 and a belated Happy New Year on behalf of the volunteer men and women of the Beaver Bank – Kinsac Volunteer Fire Department.

The Beaver Bank – Kinsac Volunteer Fire Department continues to keep busy responding to emergency calls, training every Tuesday night, and getting visiting within out beautiful community. addition, we participated in our Medical First Responder re-certification course which keeps us proficient in our skills for medical assistance calls which makes up about 65% of our call volume. Another little statistic to start the new year, we currently have 21 active firefighters & officers plus 5 support members for а total complement of 26 members.

The call outs for emergency responses continue to keep us busy. We ended 2019 with a total of 171 call outs for assistance. Since the arrival of 2020, the members of the fire department have responded to 7 incidents so far. The breakdown of the 34 callouts that your department has responded to since the last issue of the bulletin are as follows. We responded to have medical assists, 7 structure fires (mutual aid), 1 structure fire (our area), 1 car fire, 2 alarm activations, 2 motor vehicle accidents, chimney fires calls, 1 CO activation, detector investigation calls, 1 aircraft emergency standby, and 1 power line / tree on fire call.

The Beaver Bank Association Awareness continues to work with the fire department in order to provide free civic signs to residents to help responders find you in the time of an emergency. We encourage anyone who lives in Beaver Bank who does not have a one of these high visibility civic signs to drop by and take advantage of this wonderful opportunity.

Even though we have not received much snow so far this season as compared to

Atlantic of other parts Canada, winter is far from over and you never know when the next blizzard or snow event is around the corner. The fire department would like residents who live in areas where there are fire hydrants, if you could adopt the fire hydrant next to your property for the winter season and keep it clear of ice and snow. The ideal cleared out space is about 3 feet around the hydrant and

can save precious time in the event we have a fire emergency on your street.

As it is winter, snow and ice will collect on the roads and on your vehicle. Make sure to clean the snow off your vehicle so that you have an un-obstructed view around you, drive for the conditions you are experiencing on the road, give yourself a little more distance between you and the car in front in case of a sudden stop on icy roads, and give yourself a little extra time getting to your destination. We want everyone to get safely home to enjoy the company of family and loved ones.

In the last Update from Station 48 – we were in full swing with our "Fill the Port-A-Tank for the Food Bank" event. This is our second year we have held this event to raise food donations and cash donations for a local food bank in the area. The fire department would like to thank those helped in raising awareness of our event and those that donated food or money for this special initiative. We were able to raise over \$700 dollars in money donations and about 1000lbs of food which we delivered to the Gateway Food Bank on the Beaver Bank Road.



On behalf of the volunteers that make up your fire department, I want to thank the community we serve for supporting your local fire department and its members; together our community grows stronger.

Over the years there is one organization in Beaver Bank that has continually pushed the needs of our community to the forefront and rarely have they been given the full credit for what they have continue done and group accomplish. This started in the 1970's with an Ad Hoc committee when the proposal for putting a landfill Beaver Bank presented. To say the least they were successful but this just started the group to continue looking into other concerns that affected our community. In 1995 this group took on the name "Beaver Bank Community Awareness Association" (BBCAA) with a mandate to focus on enhancing security awareness and while recognizing individuals in Beaver Bank.

The successes of this organization have literally changed the look of Beaver Bank and what is available today. To list all the successes and the people helped through this organization would be quite

the task. I wish to share a few of the BBBA's accomplishments with you in this small list:

- Established and produced the Beaver Bank Kinsac Bulletin
- Promoted and established a Steering Committee to Create a Community Centre for Beaver Bank
- Developed a Community Dividend Fund

- Financial support given out for scholarships/bursari es, food banks, and local families in need

- the Beaver Bank Volunteer Fire Dept.
- Sponsor Delany Park, Skate park and lost creek park

Happy New Year! I want to wish you and your family the best of health and happiness for a prosperous 2020. It has been an honour and a pleasure meeting and working with many of you throughout this past year.

Heritage Day – 2020 Honouree: The Community of Africville

Nova Scotia Heritage Day is an annual opportunity to different celebrate contributions Nova to Scotia's storied past and diverse culture and learn more about our history in the process. This year's Heritage Day is February 17 and will feature the community of Africville. This African Nova Scotian community was located on the shores of the Bedford Basin. Built bv descendants of the Black Loyalist and the Black Refugees who came to Nova Scotia in the late 1700s and early 1800s. The Church was the centre of the community which included a school, post office, and several stores and businesses owned by residents. Throughout the history of Africville. unhealthy and unwanted institutions were placed


within and around the community, deteriorating land values and quality of In 2002, Africville life. the National received Historic Site designation. In 2004, the United Nations declared the treatment and destruction of Africville a crime against humanity. In 2010, Africville received an official apology from the Halifax Regional Municipality.

2019 Marks Second Year of Strong Employment Growth

Nova Scotia experienced the fastest employment growth and labour force growth since 2004 last year.

The unemployment rate also averaged 7.2 per cent 2019, the lowest unemployment rate since the early 1970s. Almost half of the annual job growth is attributable to improved employment for vouth. The attraction and retention of youth continues to be a priority for our province. We will continue to support our youth and employers by making investments programs like the Graduate to Opportunity program, which has attached 1,000 young Nova Scotians to the workforce. Youth aged 1524 are experiencing the lowest annual youth unemployment rate since Youth 2007 and employment is up 8.1 per cent in 2019. Many of our young Nova Scotians are finding more employment opportunities and choosing to stay and work in the province.

From Lisa Blackburn – The Beaver Bank Bus

Below is a summary of transit changes since lisa has taken office

- In 2016, about a month following my election Councillor for District 14, the Moving Forward Together Plan (MFTP) passed was Regional Council; at which time the routes had already been determined and the public consultation complete.
- I made it very clear that I was not happy with the of cancellation the North Beaver Bank route and questioned the passenger numbers used to justify the cancellation. I felt the numbers were too old and did not accurately reflect those currently using transit. I asked for a new count to be done in early 2017; however, the numbers were still below the threshold needed to maintain the service.
- In August 2018, I asked staff for a report on the possibility of keeping bus service during morning and afternoon peak hours. That suggestion was voted down by the Transportation Standing Committee and Regional Council in January 2019.
- The current changes were not supposed to happen for another year; however, upgrades to Halifax Transit software meant the changes could be fast-tracked.
- Since January, I have met with concerned community members to

- discuss alternatives as well as three of the community transit service providers in the province: MusGo Rider, East Hants Rider and West Hants Transit. They all require from permission the provincial Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board (NSUARB) to expand their service area and none were interested in expansion at this time.
- I also studied a pilot project conducted in Cape Breton that used local taxi services to provide transit options in communities. While great in theory, it requires grants from the municipality to be provided to taxi drivers. Under the Halifax Charter. we are not permitted to do that and, amendments to the Halifax Charter can only be made by the provincial government.
- lvv Meadows The facility does have a bus for residents but was not interested in expanding the service.
- Recently, the province announced a Rural Ride Share Field Test that uses ride-sharing to help with public transportation in rural areas. I have written to The Honourable Minister Mombourguette Derek (see letter below) asking that North Beaver Bank be considered for the pilot project

- Unfortunately, none of this means anything to a resident who has taken the bus for 30 years and now has no service. For this, I am very sorry. If I had the ability to demand the route be maintained, it would have been done long ago. Sadly, my powers are limited. Be assured that I am not done fighting for North Beaver Bank service. It may mean going back to our roots and the days of the Beaver Bank Bullet - it will take a community effort and I will work with any group in support of such an initiative.
- I have also suggested residents look into HfxRidematch.ca, carpooling register that could help residents looking for rides.

For the majority of Beaver Bank, the recent changes introduced by Halifax Transit bring a level of Transit Service unheard of in our history. It is my hope that Express Bus Service and more а consistent/expanded schedule will entice residents to take the bus.
