H.T. Barrett Junior High Captures Hockey Championship



**HAROLD T. BARRETT JR. HIGH
"B" DIVISION CHAMPIONS**



The Harold T. Barrett Junior High Hockey Team capped off a successful season with a championship win over A.J. Smeltzer Junior High. This is the first team championship of any kind since the grade 9 students were moved to Lockview High School in 1998. Typically, without grade 9 students, the sports teams at HTBJH find themselves overmatched. However, this year's hockey team was far from typical. It started back in November with a tie

versus the defending champions from GP Vanier. This was followed by 2 strong victories over École du Sommet and Five Bridges Junior High. Then on November 26th, the HTBJH Bulldogs suffered their first loss to the hands of A.J. Smeltzer Junior High. Not deterred by their loss, they bounced back with back-to-back victories over Cavalier Drive School and Rocky Lake Junior High. Finally, on January 7, the Bulldogs wrapped up their regular season with

a tie against Brookside Junior High. This placed HTBJH in second place out of 8 teams and set up a two game-total goal semi-final series against GP Vanier Junior High. The Bulldogs dominated both games as they recorded identical scores of 5-2 in each game. This set up a much-anticipated rematch versus A.J. Smeltzer for the league championship.

The final game was a hard-fought affair that saw 2 lead changes and tremendous play from

both squads. HTBJH opened the scoring when grade 7 student, Ryan Francis, scored a goal-mouth goal on a feed from Evan MacKinnon. A.J. answered with two goals before the mid-way point of the second period to take the lead only to have HTBJH tie the game on another goal from Ryan Francis. At the end of the second period, the game was tied 2-2. With only 10 minutes to play and the pressure mounting, Coach Moore shortened his bench and asked his players to increase the intensity and push for one shot at glory. Grade 8 student, Dawson White drew an A.J. player into taking a penalty and the Bulldogs went on the power play. Coach Moore sent out Ewan Kelly at center, between Ryan Francis and Blake Trueman with Josh Moore and Evan MacKinnon on the point. Kelly won the face off and the

puck was quickly moved to Moore for a slap shot from just inside the blue line. The shot was partially blocked and directed into the corner by a desperate A.J. defender. Both Trueman and Kelly forced a turnover behind the A.J. net and the puck was passed directly out front to MacKinnon who was parked in the high slot. MacKinnon snapped a quick shot that was stopped by the A.J. goalie but not smothered. All three HTBJH forwards battled for the loose puck and it ended up on the stick of grade 8 student, Ewan Kelly. Kelly buried the puck in the back of the net igniting a celebration of epic proportions. The remaining 5 minutes passed by tremendously slow as A.J. attacked in waves but the defense of HTBJH stood the test with goaltender, Caleb Gray, making a number of game-saving stops.

When the final buzzer sounded, the team poured onto the ice in celebration as the fans saluted their Champions with the blowing of horns, exuberant cheers and thunderous applause. It was a memorable moment for all involved.

For the months of January and February your Fire Dept. has responded to 27 calls. They consisted of: 1 power pole fire, 1 dumpster fire, 1 propane leak, 2 MVA, 2 chimney fires, 1 possible structure fire, 1 illegal burn and 18 medical assists. This brings our total for the year to 27. Once

again medical assists make up the majority of our calls.

With the time change I want to remind everyone to please change the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. Remember only working alarms save lives!

Now that the weather is getting milder, the ice will be thinner so please be careful and check the ice thickness reports on the HRM website, www.halifax.ca under Ice Thickness Reports.

With the arrival of spring it also means people are going to want to get back outside and burn the brush laying around their property. The safest time to burn brush is in the winter or early spring when the woods are wet. I also want to remind people that burning permits are required from April 15th to October 15th.

Enjoy the milder weather and play safe!

Homes were lost during the last two major fires that occurred in HRM. Did you know that homes can be lost even with the fire not coming close to the structure?

Why?

MP News and Views

Winter Olympics

Congratulations to all of our athletes who represented Canada during the 22nd Winter Olympic Games and Paralympic Games in Sochi, Russia. We are all very proud of your achievements. A special thanks to the many parents, coaches, and volunteers who helped our Olympic athletes achieve their potential and excel at their sport.

Budget 2014

The 2014 budget unveiled by the federal government is disappointing. The budget takes very little action on many of the challenges facing Canadians including unemployment and job growth. It also makes many commitments for government spending well into the future, meaning funds will not start to flow until after the 2015 election.

Here are some of the concerns:

- Health care premiums for retired federal public service employees will double and increase by \$300 per year. These changes will affect all retired federal employees who receive a federal pension or federal health care insurance benefits, including retired members of the Canadian Forces and RCMP. This increase will affect over 500,000 retirees. Last year, the National Association of Federal Retirees launched a national campaign against the increase of health premiums and submitted petitions to the House of Commons with more than 24,000 signatures.
- More than \$3 billion of spending for military equipment will be deferred to the fiscal years beyond 2018-2019, confirming that this federal government has seriously mishandled defence

procurement. This is the second time Ottawa has deferred defence procurement spending in a budget and raises questions as to whether the government will spend this money at all.

- The Budget is pushing ahead with the federal Canada Job Grant program despite opposition from several provinces and employers. If an agreement is not reached with the provinces before April 1, the federal government will deliver the program itself through Service Canada. Last year the government announced this new program without consulting with the provinces and spent \$2.5 million on advertising before the program existed.

On a positive note, Budget 2014 did address a few key issues raised by our party including an elimination of pay-to-pay fees, investments for more food inspectors at the Canadian Food Inspection Agency, and some new investment in rural broadband service.

Uncertain Future for Rail Service in Atlantic Canada

Recently, Canadian National (CN) announced plans to abandon a stretch of track between Miramichi and Bathurst, as they no longer use

the line to transport freight. Without federal government investment in this stretch of rail line, residents are concerned that the future of coast-to-coast passenger rail service is at risk. Over 25,000 residents have signed a petition asking the federal government to invest in this line.

It is very unfortunate that the federal government do not seem interested in investing and protecting our rail service. Two years ago, the federal government cut VIA Rail's federal subsidies by \$6.5 million in 2012, \$15.1 million in 2013-14 and \$19.6 million in 2014. This led Via Rail to cut its passenger train service in Halifax, Toronto, Vancouver and Winnipeg. Currently, passenger train service runs only three days per week from Halifax to Montreal, a 50 per cent cut. These cuts in service have hurt many residents living in small and rural communities in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Quebec.

As your elected representative I will continue to press this federal government to invest in rail service.
