MLA Hines and Provincial Issues

Since the last publication the constituency of Waverley-Fall River-Beaver Bank has held the First Annual Volunteer Award banquet. Thirteen recipients were chosen by peer groups from all communities to be honored for volunteer commitment. Those recipients and nominators are featured in this publication. I would like to congratulate all award winners and in particular Sheila King, the 2004 Volunteer of the Year.

Next year I would like to see more candidates from your groups and from politically active groups, such as ratepayers and citizen committees. Committee members Crawford Reid, Delphus Roy and John Boudreau performed almost flawlessly and will be in charge again next year. The new Community Center in Beaver Bank has been suggested for the banquet next year and will be a great choice to honor volunteers, perhaps a special award to the volunteers who were successful in making the facility a reality. Beaver Bank certainly is a great example of a community that realizes and utilizes its' tremendous volunteers.

During the election campaign I, with my campaign team, had the opportunity to visit the Lost Creek Golf and Country Club and see first hand the contribution to the culture and character of the community. I would like to wish the owners, Larry and Colleen Gumbley a successful season as their beautiful course continues to grow and bloom to maturity.

Over the summer I will continue efforts to have problems with snow and ice conditions in North Beaver Bank addressed. The best solution would be inclusion of the HRM portion, presently served by the province, added to the HRM service area to assure time lines and quality of service is consistent throughout the community. This could be done with a service agreement between the two levels of government that allows consistency in service.

The provincial budget has allowed tenders to be issued for the construction of a brand new Cobequid Community

Health Centre to serve the communities of Sackville, Bedford, Waverley, Fall River, Beaver Bank and Hammonds Plains. The centre is scheduled to open in 2005.

Other budget highlights called for \$20 million more in education and \$6 million more for highways over and above the 200+ million to health. Finance minister Peter Christie made tough choices to balance the budget but the choices were right for Nova Scotians.

As everyone knows there were changes made to the previously announced 10% tax cut. Regardless, 96% of Nova Scotians will pay less tax than in 2003. For taxable income up to \$29,500 the 2003 rate – 9.77%, will be reduced to 8.79%. The rates for other earners will remain at 2003 levels. The tax reduction adjustments are designed to ensure that low-income Nova Scotians will be those least affected by the adjustment. At the other end of the spectrum, the high-income surtax remains in effect. Most Nova Scotians will continue to benefit from some tax reduction even after the adjustment. All tax filers save 10 per cent on their first \$29,590 of earnings.

June 28th**

My Memory Lane

Sometimes, now living away from my hometown of **Beaver Bank**, N.S. (oooh yes...TWO words...and that's how we ALWAYS spelled it), and having some free time on my hands; I get to feeling a little homesick or nostalgic. Then I start reminiscing of days gone by and try to remember how things "used to be in the old days". Things did not seem nearly as complicated. But, isn't that how it's supposed to be for kids and youths? Don't tell me a lot of you cannot relate to these tidbits from the 50's and 60's! Please forgive me if I misspell a name or two.

1. Shiny (black) fish hooks from the store at Kinsac Corner @ 2 for 5 cents.
2. A fishing pole was usually an alder bush with black textile line wound on the end of it with just one of those plain old black shiny hooks. Add a worm and you ate fish for supper. Hardly knew what a reel was.
3. "SCOTTIES" potato chips with prize stars printed on the foil-over-paper bag.
4. Jawbreakers. Cracker Jacks with a prize insidePINK popcorn (prizes too?).
5. FRESH sliced bologna (same store as the hooks).
6. Television came along: Black and white of course. Remember the TEST PATTERN? We saw a lot of that back in the 50's. Disney, Howdy Doody and Clarabell, Lone Ranger, and Richard Greene was "Robin Hood". Not every house had a television, or a refrigerator for that matter, "back then".
7. 78's (records).....45's too ... Frank's Bandstand on TV (and Dave Lafave?).
8. Meccano Sets. (He means the metal kind, not the new plastic ones! -The Editor)
9. "It's In The Book" (that was a narrative type song...which we thought was absolutely hilarious EVERY time we heard it.)
10. Watching the Beaver Bank road get paved for the FIRST time. AND gettin' yelled at for messing in the tar.
11. Watching the bridge being built in the 50's and now only to see another one replacing it, in the 90's.
12. Metal clickers on your heels ... Air rifles.
13. Cars didn't have "Safety Inspections".
14. Disc Jockeys did the dances at the local schools and halls then too. It's not a

new thing. "Record Hops" are not Olympic sporting events... Neither are "sock-hops".

15. The ice-cream truck (when it showed) had DRY ICE in it to keep things cool. Of course we called it HOT ICE 'cause it burned our fingers when we touched it.
16. Car horns sounded like "barnp" not "Beep". Beep was a beverage.
17. "Vacuum Operated" windshield wipers on cars, they practically stopped dead when you were driving up-hill. Ask if that was scary at night.
18. Going to the Rawdon Picnic. Going to Rawdon to pick blueberries too.
19. A truckload of kids going to the drive-in, in Verney Lively's pick-up truck on "Buck Night". That was Tuesday night and all went in for one greenback dollar. How many times did we watch "Old Yeller"? We could also watch *harness racing* at Sackville Downs, through the fence. There was also an old airplane behind the pond at the gas station in Sackville (across from "Dave's" Diner where the Downsview Motel now stands) (Billy Ward eventually hauled that plane to his place on the Kinsac Rd. and scrapped it)..... Going to Sackville, Bedford or Halifax was an EVENT! Leaving the county was almost unheard of.
20. Verney Lively (Sr.) was also our local barber. His son, John, once installed a car steering wheel on his bicycle ('cause he wasn't old enough to have a car).
21. Stores and canteens; ... canteens first. ... Merle's (Lively), Veneta's (Graves), Jimmie's (Boutilier) (right about where the new community centre is being built), Hughie's (Barrett), Casey's, Shea's, and I think Paul Barrett had one too, near where the present entrance to H.T.B. Jr High is.... Stores...Harry Donahee's, and later to become Ray Harnish's store and gas pumps. Blake Lively's store and gas. Manny Lively's store up at "The Base". ... Larder's in Kinsac
22. Hey.....who remembers when the Beaver Bank Villa was called "THE BASE"? Actually, R.C.A.F. Beaver Bank.
23. Going swimming at the pool on "The Base". (Seems I can almost smell that chlorinated water).
24. Going "night fishing" for eels in the Beaver Bank River ... and Ball games at the "Deep Hole"...swimming in the Beaver Bank River.

25. Picking raspberries to sell for pocket money...(and walking for miles to sell them).

26. Greyish blue military buses going up and down the B.B. road. This was before ANY school buses. We WALKED! A grader was the only thing that could plow the snow in the wintertime. Remember seeing Blake Lively's old dump truck?
27. The area where the ball field, clubhouse, and tennis courts are now, used to be called "The Flat". It would flood to almost impassable.
28. Who remembers the "GREENROADS" and the *supposed* legend?? Has any body living in the area of Birch Road seen any strange things on the road at night???
29. There was a "Teen Club". They held dances and such. Wayne Jefferies could out-dance darn near anybody. Sometimes there were "rock-a-thons" ...actually rocking chair contests to see who could continually rock the longest in the chair (for days).... non-stop, for prizes. We would get the Halifax radio station(s) involved in that.
30. The "white" school had 2 classrooms upstairs and one in the basement. I think I went to all three rooms over the years. The Nicholson family lived in the upper apartment for a time. Woody and Pearl were teachers and Woody was the principal. Remember that leather strap? Lord help ya! Mrs Jane Jack taught the young'ns. Mrs MacDonnell taught music. There was an earlier schoolhouse. It became home for a few different families until it burned.
31. Boats on Tucker Lake ...belonging to Ray Harnish and Johnny Gillis. Jimmy Huntley had some kind of a racing speedboat back when? It would send "rooster tails" of water flying high into the air as it zoomed over Tucker Lake.
32. Halloween meant a long walk if you wanted to get some treats ... and yes the treats were all SAFE to eat.
33. Entertaining ourselves...depended on the season.... how about lugging a car tire to the frozen ponds (Duck Pond at Kinsac Corner and "The Pit " down off the west side of Beaver Bank Hill, near the B.B. Forest Camp ... holding onto car bumpers in the winter time, to get a "free tow" down the road to one of our local canteens..... swimming across Tucker Lake and back!..... raiding vegetable gardens with a salt shaker in our pockets corn boils and wiener roasts..... catching cat-fish in Duck Pond and The Pit (Oh Yes there *were* cat-fish)... changing your clothes in the woods across the road from Tucker Lake, only to find you'd laid your dry clothes down on a wasps nest just proved that you could run out and across the road and into the lake before anybody saw you (if you weren't screaming too loudly!).

34. Beaver Bank had 3 "zones", North Beaver Bank, Middle Beaver Bank and South Beaver Bank. We lived in "Middle" and there were people living in South and North that we'd never heard of!! We lived near a lot of our relatives.

35. Travelling and local peddlers... Elsie Beamish selling Strawberries (she pronounced it "Strorbries") and other such produce. The "egg man" selling eggs and produce. Watkins salesman... Rawleigh Salesman... Fuller Brush man.

36. Some quickies: ... Leo Hopkins (Sr.) delivering mail... Jack (Lane?) on the milk truck ... Don Kelly (Kinsac Rd.) gave harmonica lessons ... cars on the ice on Tucker Lake ... Canada Dry WHITE (actually clear) cream soda ... Nessbitt's Orange... a "fair" at Clara and Jim Antle's place ... the "hangin' tree" on National Drug Hill in Kinsac ... flight boots in the winter ... Ken Margeson's bees and hives ... Frostie Root Beer ... walking everywhere ... no streetlights!

Well... that's about the end of *My stroll down memory lane*. I'm sure there's a lot I missed. Some folks will get a good snicker out of some of these old memories of growing up in Middle Beaver Bank. Some may lie awake a little while longer tonight...just thinkin'. Yeah, I know some are wondering...so...I was born in 1950. I left Beaver Bank about 2 years ago and now reside in Scotchtown, Cape Breton Island, N.S. I had to take my wife "home" 'cause she was gettin' home sick too ... but I'm still a Beaver Banker.

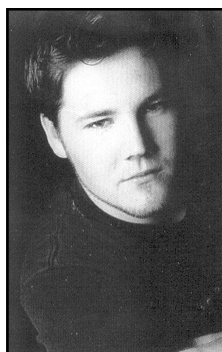

I am very pleased with the government's recent decision to purchase three new ships for the Canadian Navy. Now we must ensure that these ships are built in Canada. We certainly have the capacity to build them, with highly skilled workers right here in Halifax and across the country. We can only hope that the government will make this wise decision, and that in turn it will kick-start a revitalization of the industry.

Amateur Sports: No Government Support for Healthy Choices

On March 31, there was a debate in the House of Commons on Bill C-210, my Amateur Sports private members bill. The purpose of the bill, more or less, is to encourage physical activity and participation in amateur sport by allowing the registration fee of that activity to be claimed as tax deduction, similar to that

of a charity deduction. There has been a major increase in obesity and related diseases in Canada (including diabetes and heart disease), adding tremendous costs to the health care system as well as related costs to the social and justice systems. Everyone who works with the youth of today knows that when kids are physically active they become better citizens. As George Chuvalo, former Canadian heavyweight boxing champion of 21 years has said, "*A healthy body and a healthy mind makes healthy choices,*" which in turn leads to a healthy society.

The Canadian government should be leading the example in a healthier nation; however, the Liberals and Conservatives would not support this initiative. If we hope to save money on health care and other social costs, this is the obvious place to start. Another initiative in Saskatchewan is their lottery trust fund, whereby 23¢ of every dollar on lottery

sales goes towards sports, culture and recreation. The Nova Scotia Conservatives, comparatively, put these funds into their general revenues. Not only should the Nova Scotia government put a contribution towards sport as an incentive for lower income families, but they should also bring physical education back as an integral part of the school system.
