## Community Centre Gears Up for First Year

It has been a rewarding, if not busy, few years to see the Beaver Bank Kinsac Community Centre become a reality for the community of Beaver Bank. There are a few among those individuals and organizations that have played a large part in the success of this project, who I feel need to be mentioned. The first is Councillor Brad Johns, who originally brought the idea to the BBCCA and who has offered continued support and guidance throughout this endeavor. Next, the BBCCA should be commended for their vision and assistance in organizing the community and establishing the Steering Committee. The Steering Committee, headed by Brian Johnson and Sue McLearn, were the true visionaries in the planning phase. Then in June 2003 at the 1st Annual BBKCC General Meeting, the Board of Directors was formally elected. The Board of Directors has worked diligently over the past year to see the construction through to completion and to ensure that appropriate policies and procedures were in place to guide in the operation of the organization. I would be remiss if I did not mention the guidance and assistance provided by Norma MacLean over the past three years. you to everyone who had, or continues to have, a part in this project. Without you there would be less of Beaver Bank to love.

With the "warm" weather (and I use this term loosely), came a busy summer for the Community Centre. The 2nd Annual General Meeting was held in the large multipurpose room of the Beaver Bank Kinsac Community Centre on June 24, 2004, with approximately 46 people in attendance. We saw a couple of our members / advisors on our Board of Directors leave due to other commitments. Laurie Campbell has stepped down from the Board of Directors, after being part of the original Steering Committee for a couple of years and then a member of the Board of Directors for the past year. In addition, Norma MacLean, our HRM Staff Advisor, is moving to a different position in HRM and will no longer be working out of this area. Therefore she will not be able to continue filling the position of HRM Staff Advisor. We wish both Laurie and Norma the best in all their future endeavors and look forward to keeping in touch with them in the days and months to come.

The position of Vice Chair on the Board of Directors was opened to the community for nominations at the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual General Meeting on June 24, 2004. Unfortunately it still remains unfilled. It is essential that this position be filled in the coming months, as it is a key step in our succession planning for the Chair position. # University Studies Lead to African Trip

Jennifer Mullane, daughter of Sherry and Mike Mullane and granddaughter of Marion and Aubrey Gilby, Lexie Mullane and the late Hugh Mullane, grew up in Beaver Bank. She attended Beaver Bank Kinsac School, Harold T Barrett Jr High and graduated from Millwood High School in 2001. She was the recipient of many awards, the Queen Elizabeth Award and many scholarships. While a pathfinder she received her Canada Cord, travelled to Portugal and went north to Whitehorse to hike the Chilkoot Trail. At Millwood High her class enjoyed a March Break in Europe. In August 2001 she left Beaver Bank for McGill University to study Environmental Science. Part of her studies included a field component. Her choice was Africa for three months. This is Jennifer's story:

As part of the Environmental Science program at McGill University I must complete a field component. There were several field locations to choose from: the Bay of Fundy, Arizona, Mt. Saint-Hilaire (Quebec), Schefferville (in the Arctic) and Panama are among them, but I chose to go to Kenya. McGill's Canadian Field Studies in Africa (CFSIA)

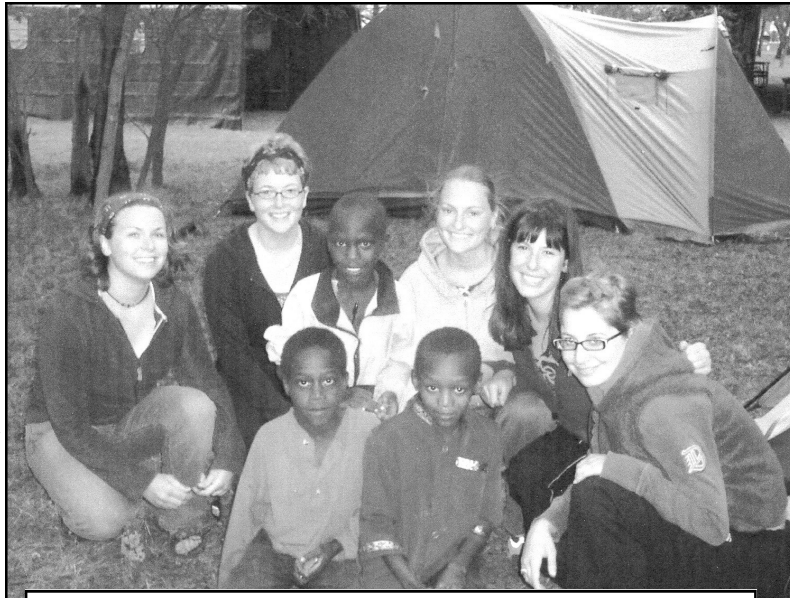
program offered us a full university semester away from concrete-walled lecture halls and the chance to take courses in anthropology, archaeology, biology, environmental management and so much more -I couldn't resist!

CFSIA is open to students from any university; this year we were 38 students from 8 Canadian schools and one student from an Australian school. We were all eager to study the rich and complex culture of Kenya, to see with our own eyes some of the world's greatest wildlife in some of the world's most interesting ecosystems and, above all, to have an amazing African adventure. Excitement and enthusiasm aside, none of us really knew what Kenya or the CFSIA program would be like ...it didn't take long for us

to find out.

Kenya straddles the equator in East Africa; its shoreline meets the Indian Ocean. Kenya has a short rainy season from April to June, but otherwise the weather is quite agreeable, lots of sunshine, high temperatures at low altitudes, more moderate ones in the highlands. There are no distinct seasons and the sun rises and falls at 6:30am and 6:30pm, respectively, throughout the whole year.

Evidence of Kenya's status as a developing country and the fact that it

used to be a British colony is apparent in the country's people, customs, and conflicts. The social structure is incredibly varied; many of the people we met live in huts made of a mud and cow dung mixture while others live in large mansions. Many of the wealthier people in Kenya make big salaries working at the United Nations' Nairobi office. Swimming pools, servants, and fenced-in estates are the norm in many of Nairobi's (the capital city) suburbs, but brushing one's teeth with an olive tree twig, and using sheep and goats as currency is still common in rural parts of the country.

It wasn't just the social scientists that were in their glory though; the biologists and environmental scientists among us had plenty to explore as well! We visited

several national parks and game reserves where we were able to observe, in their natural environments, lions, zebras, elephants, cheetahs, crocodiles, hippos, rhinos ...the list is endless! Aside from courses focusing on Kenya's mega-fauna there was also one devoted to studying the birds of Kenya and another to the country's marine ecosystem. In our marine biology class we studied coastal plant and animal life and collected and analysed data on the physical properties of the near-shore waters.

Day to day life with CFSIA was never predictable. After a maximum of 5 days camping at a site we would hop in to our big retired military trucks and move on to another part of the country. Field activities included; hikes, debates, guest speakers, exploring small towns, chatting with local people, visiting the United Nations, visiting the University of Nairobi, meeting with NGOs, game drives, and even snorkelling and SCUBA diving while we were on the coast.

I hope this has given you a little taste of Kenya! I will leave you with an important piece of African wisdom, one that you may have already heard: "Hakuna Matata! -it means no worries, for the rest of your days."

## School Board Elections to be Held in October

Welcome to another wonderful summer.

This has been a fantastic year, when you look at the educational objectives of the Board. We have completed our first year of standardized assessments and, while the results are certainly not what we would like, they are something that we can start from and build upon.

These results show us, in the key areas of literacy and numeracy, how we are doing. It is my firm belief that these

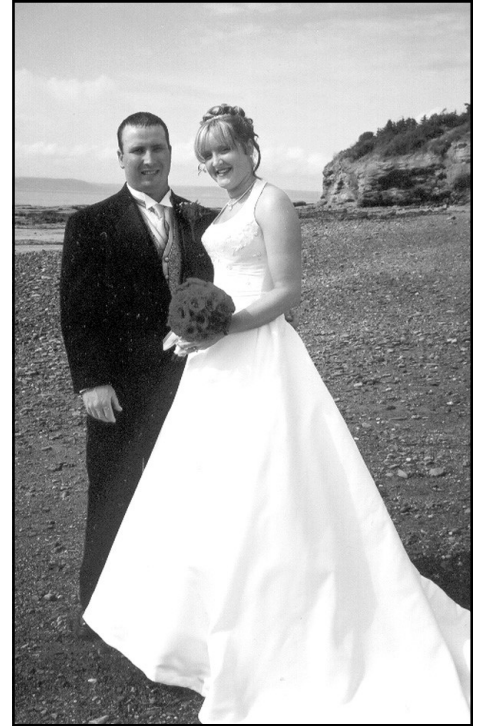

# MLA Hines Addresses Quarry Concerns

In the last edition of the Beaver Bank Kinsac Bulletin I commented on an imbalance regarding snow and ice control in North Beaver Bank. I had the opportunity to address this issue with senior officials of the Transportation Department in a provincial all parties committee. Several issues of concern regarding this area were placed before Executive Director of Highways Operations, Martin Delaney, and are to be discussed with local authorities. Conditions of the road surface in the same area were also discussed and as a result some patching and repaving has improved the area considerably.

Recently a rock quarry operation of S.W. Weeks Construction Ltd., in the East Uniacke area in the Municipality of East Hants requested an undertaking to expand the existing East Uniacke Quarry to allow for future aggregate production, stockpiling and occasional asphalt production to allow the quarry to continue operating for several decades. On June 21, 2004 Environment Minister Kerry Morash issued an approval called an 'Environmental Assessment Approval'.

*"East Uniacke Quarry Expansion (the "Undertaking"), proposed by S.W. Weeks Construction Ltd. (the "Proponent"), East Uniacke, Hants County, is approved pursuant to Section 13(1)(b). This Approval is subject to the following conditions and obtaining all other necessary approvals, permits or authorizations required by municipal, provincial and federal acts, regulations, by-laws, guidelines, policies or standards before commencing work on the Undertaking. It is the responsibility of the Proponent to ensure that all such approvals, permits or authorizations are obtained before commencing work on the Undertaking."*

This Environmental Assessment Approval is based upon the review of the conceptual design, environmental baseline information, impact predictions, and mitigation presented in the Registration Information. Key components of the agreement are;

1. General Approval: The Environmental Assessment Approval for the project is limited to the project as described in the

registration document. Any proposal by the Proponent for expansion, modification or relocation of any aspect of the project from that proposed in the registration document must be submitted to the Environmental Assessment Branch for review and may require an environmental assessment.

2. The Proponent shall form, at the request of the NSDEL, a Community Liaison Committee (CLC) in consultation with the NSDEL and with municipal and community representatives. The NSDEL *Guidelines for the Formation of a Community Liaison Committee* shall be used for the guidance of the Proponent and community.

3. The Proponent shall monitor for noise and dust at the request of the NSDEL.

4. The Proponent shall participate in future airshed management programs as required by the NSDEL.

5. The Proponent shall address transportation related concerns by ensuring that: trucking contracts stipulate adherence to speed limits, use of tarpaulins, vehicle maintenance requirements and periodic inspections.

The major concern regarding this issue was, and will continue to be the issue regarding increased truck traffic. The minister placed emphasis on this issue and a maximum number of trucks allowed exit from the quarry on a given day (peak period) will be 150 trucks as indicated in the application. Peak period trucking will occur only when a major contract is being carried out from this quarry. Community monitoring, increased safety patrol and policing will be a part of the application structure approved by the minister. This was done in recognition of community concerns voiced by Victor Cobb of the BBCAA in conversation with me through to the Minister, Kerry Morash.

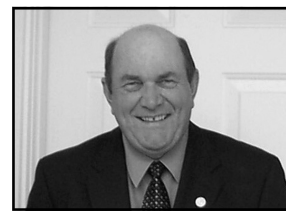

# Councillor Johns Looks Back Over Term as Beaver Bank Rep

Dear Residents of Beaver Bank and Kinsac,

It is with a heavy heart that I sit down to write this, my last Councillors update as the elected representative on Halifax Regional Council for the Beaver Bank area. As many residents have heard recently, under the direction of the Municipal Government Act and the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board, the boundaries of the Municipal Districts were reviewed with the objective of bringing the number of voters in each district in closer balance.

The board concluded that HRM would continue to have twenty-three districts; however as population changes have occurred in many areas they recommended many boundary changes. The former city of Dartmouth will have one fewer Councillor while the former City of Halifax will have one additional Councillor to service the rapidly growing area of Clayton Park.

District 19, as of the last census, contained the largest number of residents and was the third largest geographically in area. In order to achieve this balance, the URB decided to remove the entire community of Beaver Bank from the district and have joined it to the communities of Fall River / Waverly in District 2. I, and a number of residents, attended the public hearing to express our

disagreement with this decision, however to no avail. I was personally disappointed in this decision because I felt that although the process had been under review for 28 months, and three separate revisions, it was only 11 days prior to the final decision date that the board suggested this drastically different change.

Officially the change does not take effect until after the next municipal election, effective November 2, 2004 and for more information on the district boundary changes please contact me directly and I would be happy to provide a copy or you may also check the HRM website at [www.halifax.ca](http://www.halifax.ca).
