## BBCAA Holds Meeting To Discuss Road Issues

On June 15<sup>th</sup> the BBCAA conducted a meeting with Municipal & Provincial levels of government, Dept of Trans., Public Works, invited guests and our Fire Chief, to discuss recent development and its impact on our one and only Beaver Bank road.

We were a bit dismayed to learn at our AGM meeting in Feb. that the proposed bypass was not in the HRM projected 25-year plan. Our goal was to determine what plans, if any, were in place to address current and future traffic concerns, especially the impact on emergency vehicles accessing and moving around in our community. We also had landowners in attendance, who will largely be affected by the proposed HRM Development plan and the restrictions on developing non-serviced lots.

Burning permits are still a grey area, keep an eye on our sign for any new info on them or give me a call. We had our annual elections in June and the following people were elected: Chief Gord West, Deputy Chief Cory Horne, Captains Richard Crouse and Tim Keddy, Lieutenants Bob Crosby and Don Connors. Secretary Steve Bronken, and our treasurer, a man who has been around in this department for 40 yrs, yes since the very first day this department was formed, George Hull, now that's volunteering!!!

As you might have figured this is our 40th anniversary, and we will be celebrating it in Sept. Those of you who have at one time been in the dept and would like to attend this event please give me a call as my list may not be as accurate as it should be. This will be by invite only, so please book early as the Centre only holds so many people.

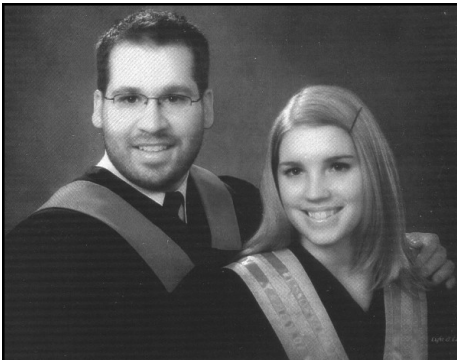

When the property across from the ball field was being cleared, a rumour went through the community that a cemetery was planned for the property. A call to the owners confirmed that the land was simply being cleaned up after Hurricane Juan.

### Ticks Found by Residents of Beaver Bank

Please be advised that there have been ticks found in Beaver Bank by several residents. Use of a DEET based insect spray will deter ticks, but also it takes a few hours for a tick to become fully attached, so check yourself over carefully after you have been in long grass and bushy areas. The below advice is from the Dept of Natural Resources website, which also has more info on ticks.

“If a tick becomes attached, use tweezers to carefully grasp the body of the tick as close to the skin as possible. Pull slowly to allow the tick to release its mouthparts prohibiting breakage within the skin. Avoid twisting or turning the tick because this could also cause the mouthparts to be broken off. DO NOT use matches, cigarettes, pins, or gasoline to attempt to remove the tick. This may only irritate the tick into spitting up contents of its stomach into the host. The use of Vaseline or other oil products is not recommended, because it may take hours to suffocate a tiny oil coated tick. Following the removal of the tick wash the area thoroughly and apply an antiseptic, such as alcohol. If infection occurs, contact your doctor.”

## **NSCC students create a new fund for bone marrow transplant patients & families.**

Medical Transcription Program students from NSCC, Institute of Technology Campus have created a new fund to support bone marrow transplant patients and their families. This fund was started in honour of faculty member Joy Reyno and her husband Mike Davidson who reside in Beaver Bank.

As part of their program, the students were assigned a service leadership project entitled "helping others in health care". Instructions included choosing a project to benefit the sick, elderly or less fortunate, particularly involving individuals, groups or causes that are sometimes forgotten or overlooked. As a result, the class formed into two groups and each group selected to support Bone Marrow Transplant work and awareness.

The first group, calling themselves "Project Comfort" chose to adopt the patients and families admitted for care at the Bone Marrow Transplant Unit at Capital Health and create a fund to support their needs during their sometimes long stay in the isolation unit. This group organized various fundraising activities and as a result the students are donating \$2,000 to Capital Health, care of Dr. Stephen Couban, Bone Marrow Transplant Specialist.

"This project was a real eye opener for me regarding the process involved for a bone marrow transplant," says Helen Mailman a student in the program. "I find it hard to comprehend being isolated anywhere from 3 weeks to 6 months and along with the isolation is the strain on the family both emotionally and financially. The funds raised from this project will help to lessen the financial strain on the families."

The second group organized an information session at NSCC, Institute of Technology Campus to increase awareness of the need for donor/registrants for the Unrelated Bone Marrow Donor Registry. Over 60 people attended and

expressed interest in the registry. "Blood donations are more common and everyone knows how to donate but becoming a possible bone marrow donor is not as well known to the general public," says Lianne Giffin, Medical Transcription Student. "One person has already signed up to become a donor after our information session, that one person could save someone's life. That is better than a passing grade."

The students chose the cause themselves. They were however inspired by the bravery of their faculty member, Joy Reyno, as her husband conquered leukemia thanks to a successful bone marrow transplant over one year ago. "I was proud and honoured by the student's selection of the Bone Marrow Transplant Unit to be the benefactor of their projects," says Joy Reyno. "Both projects helped the students build their leadership skills and gave them the satisfaction of knowing they were helping others."

The students have issued a challenge to other students to take on service leadership projects, as the learning and experience has such personal and community impact. "This type of project is very worthwhile, we hope that our project will become a tradition for future students of the Medical Transcription Program. We challenge next year's class to meet or exceed the \$2000 raised this year," says student Vicky Brown. "The skills that we gained from this type of Service Leadership project will stay with us long after we graduate."

## MLA Hines Announces Funding for Scouts/CC

I recently received a call from the office of Economic Development recognizing the Beaver Bank Boy Scout Troop and the Beaver Bank Kinsac Community Centre requests for funding for two specific projects. Bill Oland is handling the requests and he will work with Brian Johnson (Boy Scouts), who has requested funding for an all weather shelter to enhance economic opportunities for rental of the Boy Scout camp facilities. The Community Centre request for funding for a deck construction will be prepared by Bonnie Ryan working with Mr. Oland to develop the application. The application will then go to the Minister for approval if the applications meet funding assistance guidelines. The conversation with Mr. Oland was very positive and I look forward to approval of our projects.

I have received a number of calls regarding the completion of phase 4D of the sewer and water project in Beaver Bank. On June 29<sup>th</sup>, Minister Barry Barnet informed me the contract for this phase had been approved and construction should happen soon. I feel it is important to indicate to residents that it was a problem with the contract funding approval that caused delays.

The signatures of two Federal government ministers were necessary to move the project; because previous phases did not meet funding projections, the imbalance required shifting of funds, which

requires funding partners' approval. The total cost of the phased project is within budget; however, money needs to be shifted for 4D approval and the Federal government, seemingly, dropped the ball and only recently made the necessary signatures. I believe this is the "rob Peter to pay Paul" theory at its best and Beaver Bank was the victim.

I talked to the contractor on July 5<sup>th</sup> and only a few issues with HRM remain before the signing and actual work begins. Important to note; the contractor has agreed to accept last years prices despite growing fuel and material costs to allow the contract to move on; deserving of a big thanks!

A recent information session was chaired by Victor Cobb of the BBCCA regarding a project, "Beaver Bank Bypass" that has been shelved for a number of years. History, responsibility of HRM vs. the Province, community issues and a go forward plan regarding private property acquisition, engineering and planning and various issues regarding individual concerns with HRM long term regional plan were also discussed. Much work needs to be done to adopt a go forward agenda and your opin-

ions are important so be sure to inform your committee, your councillor, your MP and myself.

## MP Stoffer To Introduce Private Member Bills

### Invest in the Building Trade Industry

In the fall, I will submit a private members bill to encourage the federal government to re-establish mobility grants for trade industry workers. Currently, Ottawa only offers assistance or tax deductions to individuals who move permanently for work. Workers who temporarily leave their families to pursue employment are ineligible to claim moving expenses. HRDC used to offer mobility grants to help offset the high costs of temporarily moving for work. I will also ask the federal government to allow an income tax deduction for workers in the trade industry who purchase tools and equipment for employment.

### Superannuation Clawback

I have received many calls, letters, and emails from retired Canadian Forces and RCMP members whose superannuation annuity is 'clawed back' as soon as they begin to receive Canada Pension Plan benefits. The reduction formula that applies to these pensioners was created in 1966 when the CPP was introduced and integrated with the Canadian Forces Superannuation Act and RCMP Superannuation Act. At the time these plans were integrated, members were not given options as to how they wished to fund their contribution obligations. In the fall, I will introduce a private members bill to terminate the clawback. Members of the Canadian Forces and the RCMP have roles and a lifestyle distinct from the general community. During their working years they face dangerous conditions, extended family separations, hazards to health and safety, long stretches of over-time, and have to re-establish family life with new postings many times over their career. Eliminating the claw back would assist in recognizing their special contributions to our country.

### Recognition of Nova Scotia's Black Veterans

On July 9<sup>th</sup>, the Black Cultural Society of Nova Scotia held a service honouring the contributions of Nova Scotia's black veterans. The ceremony recognized the members of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Construction Battalion C.E.F. - Canada's only black battalion - at the site of the force's headquarters in Pictou. Members of the Battalion formed the unit in World War I, at a time when Black Canadians were not allowed to join the military. The Construction Battalion built bridges and roads for other military units and disarmed land mines. It took two years of lobbying before the government authorized the organization of the Battalion. Their efforts helped encourage the government to end racial discrimination in the military. We thank all veterans who fought for the freedom of all Canadians and remember those who gave their lives for our country.
