## Woodbine Has New Family Association

The Woodbine Family Association would like to introduce ourselves as a newly registered volunteer organization. We are a group of tenants from Woodbine Mobile Home Park formed over the summer with help from Councillor Krista Snow, and Community Developer Darren Hirtle from HRM.

Why would we start an association? Well, our mandate is to work with park management and tenants to make our home a better place to live! We are here to give a voice to concerns anyone in our community might have, and help in finding a solution. We are people like you who are dedicated and determined to make Woodbine a better and safer place to live for everyone – bringing back a sense of pride to our community. Our biggest two concerns at the moment are security and something for the children to do.

We are working on a Neighbourhood Watch Program, and talking with RCMP to have more patrols come through the park in the run of a week. Watch for a flyer coming around with Neighbourhood Watch and City Watch information, but the second part is where we need your help! According to the RCMP reports, our community is one of the quietest in HRM! If you want to see

more patrols, you need to report when you see something happening so that we get moved up on their list of priorities. I'm not saying to go crazy, but call the Sackville RCMP at 864-6000 to report speeding, graffiti, loitering, etc. Did you know you can make a report without giving your name? They don't even have to come out if you don't want them to! But if you don't report it, they don't see any reason to come in to the park on a regular basis.

Our second, but most important concern, is that there is very little for our kids to do besides hang out on the corner or at the store – which ties in to the loitering and graffiti. We would like to see a new recreation area in the park, complete with playground and a skate park. We are working with Councillor Snow and HRM in cooperation with Havill's to secure the field on GlenRise as an ideal central location. We have also had representatives from the Community Centre, Scouting, and the schools come to our meetings – so we have made some good contacts if you want something for your children to do after school.

Don't think you have the money, but you really want your children to be able to participate? We have decided to help

## **No Brush Fires For BBKVFD This Season**

For the months of July and August your Fire Dept. has responded to 19 calls. They were: 1 structure fire, 1 MVA, 1 investigation, 3 alarms activated and 13 medical assists, for a total so far this year of 69. As you can see we did not have any brush fires. I would like to thank all of you who burned safely this year. I think we are the only area in HRM who did not have any brush fires during this time. Speaking of burning, permits are required until Oct 15. After this time you don't need a permit until April 15 rolls around again. Please burn safely during the fall months, as the wind seems to be around more during this time. Hurricane season is here and so far we have been lucky, but please be ready. By that, I mean watch the weather and have your stuff on hand if we get the warning. Try not to rely on candles for your alternate source of light as candles cause many fires during the year.

This time of year means flu season, the best way to reduce the risk of getting the flu is to stay away from those who are sick and to wash your hands lots when around the general public. This flu season could be a bad one.

Wood burning season is upon us again so please make sure that all your heating appliances have been checked and cleaned and ready for the heating season. Also make sure you are burning dry seasoned wood to reduce your creosote build up. Check your chimneys at least monthly during the burning season. If you have any questions concerning wood stoves or home inspections give us a call any Tues night between 7-8 pm. @ 865 -8996.

In closing I would just like to remind you that those frosty mornings will soon be here so, drive carefully and have a great fall.

## Councillor's Corner

### Community Awareness Information Session Woodbine Community

Myself, HRM staff, and RCMP, hosted a meeting in hopes to bring community concerns to the forefront. This was an extremely positive meeting, and one of the outcomes of this meeting was the creation of the Woodbine Family Association. The group is comprised of members of the Woodbine Community who are enthusiastic and are eager to make changes for their community. There are many ideas right now being discussed. Some priority issues are community pride, policing, and recreation.

We are very excited about hosting a BBQ at the Community Green on Glen Rise Drive. The purpose of this gathering will be to discuss policing and how it affects your community. We will also focus on neighbourhood watch, city watch, Citizens on Patrol, and community pride.

### Transit

The community transit in the Beaver Bank area might be described by some as not the most efficient service. Some

residents called with concerns because they were under the impression, somehow, that I was going to cancel this service. For clarification, that is far from the truth. However, my intentions have been and will remain to enhance the service that is being provided. A clear example of an enhancement would be the ability to have transfers issued. Clearly another advantage would be improving the availability of the bus. The biggest hurdle to overcome in improving the service would be to not have the bus be used as a “yellow” bus, i.e. School Bus, in the mornings when residents need this service to go to work.

On Sept 8<sup>th</sup>, I met with Paul McDaniels, manager of HRM Transit to discuss improving the Beaver Bank service including Access-a-bus service. I am hopeful that in the next issue of the Bulletin, I will be able to give you an update on progress made. To be very clear, you are not losing your bus service. (Such as it is)

### Traffic Lights

The corner of the Beaver Bank Road and the Beaver Bank Windsor Junction Crossroad is treacherous, and a concern that I'm sure all of us share on both

sides of the tracks. I want to ensure you that I have, and will relentlessly continue to strive to get lights installed at that location. This has been brought up in the budgetary process in council, by me, for the last two years, but you need to realize that I am one councillor, and one vote. Twenty-three councillors and the Mayor decide where monies are to be allocated. Along with myself, Mayor Peter Kelly is very supportive of this project, and I am hopeful that approval will come. The question is when. The only guarantee that I have to offer in this issue is that I will push as hard and as often as I am able to see the project completed.

### Recreation

The skateboard park planned for Beaver Bank has been progressing forward. I am told by HRM staff that the tender for this project will go out shortly. It would have been nice to have this project completed earlier in the year, however, this is one project in many and it is moving in the right direction.

### John Dean First Interment at Gates of Heaven Cemetery

The following article was posted on the Rootsweb Nova Scotia genealogy list by George Newbury. It was interesting to note that the first burial at Gates of Heaven was a Beaver Banker.

Saturday, June 18, 1938 The Halifax Mail, Halifax, N.S.

To Make First Burial In New Grounds Monday

The first interment in Halifax's new "Gates of Heaven" Catholic cemetery at Lower Sackville, will be made Monday morning. The first grave in the new burial grounds will be for John Bernard Dean, 30-year-old resident of Beaver Bank, who died at his home yesterday, after a lingering illness. The Gates of Heaven Cemetery succeeds the almost half-century-old Mount Olivet Cemetery. Services for the deceased will be held from his late home in time for nine o'clock mass at St. Ignatus Church, Bedford.

Besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Dean, the deceased is survived by his widow, and three small children; five brothers, Charles, Robert, Edward, Frank and Thomas of Beaver Bank; two sisters, Mrs. C. Beals, Cumberland county, and Mrs. Roy Grantham, Halifax.

## Course For Disadvantaged Students

Halifax Humanities 101 (Clemente) is entering its second year in Halifax. The program is based on a hugely successful educational model called the Clemente Course in the Humanities. Developed and first delivered on the lower east side of Manhattan in 1995 by writer and educator Earl Shorris, the Clemente Course in the Humanities is a proven way to radically and successfully break the cycle of poverty through education. This completely free course teaches reflection and critical thinking, enabling the disadvantaged and disenfranchised to combat isolation and profound loneliness, and to navigate their way through poverty to actively participate in changing their lives. Students meet at the North Branch library in Halifax (Gottingen St.) on Tues and Thurs from 3:30 - 5:30 to interact with outstanding academic lecturers from local universities and to discuss great works of art, literature, history and film. As well, there are field trips to museums and art galleries. Last year there were

guest lectures from artist, Alex Colville and author, George Eliot Clarke. We hope to have return visits from those accomplished creators, as well as first time visits from other authors, artists and filmmakers. The lecturers teach and facilitate discussion on a variety of texts from the ancient Epic of Gilgamesh through works by Plato, Dante, Shakespeare and Jane Austen. The students are asked to read from 5 to 20 pages of text for each class. A group of last year's students were so moved by their experience that they continued to meet over the summer to discuss Dante's Inferno. The target population is people 17 years of age or older, living below the poverty line, capable of reading an English language newspaper and willing to attend classes twice a week. The students will be among those living on social assistance, those living on disability benefits and the working poor. Potential students are asked to fill out an application form, available at the North Branch Libraries in both Halifax and Dartmouth, as well as several other city libraries. Selected students are asked to come in for a 45 minute interview that explains the course in more detail, outlines the time commitment required and ascertains the transportation and childcare needs of the students. These needs will be met with no charge to the student.

## From Parliament Hill

### The New Universal Child Care Benefit

If you have children under the age of six, you may have received \$100 per child in July and August. The benefit is called the Universal Child Care Benefit Plan (UCCB). The Conservatives believe that this money will help address the child care problems faced by families across this country. There are already problems with the new UCCB program. First, any money you receive from the Universal Child Care Benefit Plan is taxable income. That means, you will need to report the amount you receive from the UCCB as income. Virtually no one will receive the full supplement amount of \$1,200 per year because of this. Second, the federal government will eliminate the young child supplement provided by the Child Tax Benefit (which is a different program) by next year. That means if you are a low income or middle income earner and receive \$1,200 per year with the new benefit, you will also likely lose \$249 from cuts to the Child Tax Benefit program. Finally, if you did not receive your new UCCB payment, you will need to apply. The payment is processed through the Canada Child Tax Benefit application. You can download the application at [www.cra-arc.gc.ca](http://www.cra-arc.gc.ca) or call 1-800-959-2221.

For many families, the new Universal Child Care Benefit Plan is a complicated plan. Many parents wanted the Conservative government to maintain the federal-provincial childcare agreements signed by the former Liberal government. These agreements would have given Nova Scotia \$137.3 million for day cares for five years. The Conservative government has withdrawn from this agreement and provided funding for only two years. The NDP is committed to a national childcare program and we will continue to work towards this goal.

### Crisis in the Middle East

Since the situation in the Middle East erupted, my colleague Alexa McDonough MP (Halifax) and NDP Foreign Affairs Critic has continuously asked the federal government to call for a ceasefire. Canadians have long championed the principle of applying pressure to end conflicts to protect civilians and enable negotiations. The NDP is concerned that the Conservative government is abandoning Canada's traditional role as a mediator. It was former Prime Minister Lester Pearson who shaped the role of Canada as a nation committed to peacekeeping. Canada must continue on this path.

### Foreign Travel

Foreign Affairs Canada offers a registration service for Canadians traveling or residing abroad. The program is called "Registration of Canadians Abroad." This service is provided in the event there is a need to contact Canadians to offer urgent advice during a natural disaster or civil unrest, or to inform them of a family emergency at home. To register, you have to be staying in a country longer than 3 months, be spending time in a country that is covered by an official travel warning or has security concerns, or traveling in a hurricane prone area during the hurricane season. For more information or to register online you can go to: [www.voyage.gc.ca](http://www.voyage.gc.ca) Also, if you are making a short term visit abroad and your trip does not meet the above criteria, you are strongly advised to do the following: leave a detailed travel itinerary and contact details with family or friends in Canada; provide family with the emergency number for Foreign Affairs Canada; keep on hand the phone numbers for the Canadian government offices in the countries they plan to visit.

### Parliament Resumes

The fall session in the House of Commons is now underway. We have lots to do. Some of our work will include discussing fixed election dates, senate reform, amendments to gun control legislation, the Afghanistan mission, and climate change solutions. Please contact me

with your feedback on these important issues.

### Thank You Canada

On September 18, 1956 my family and I passed through the gates of Pier 21 in Halifax. I was only 9 months old. With six children in tow, my mom and dad traveled by boat all the way from Holland to make Canada our new home. And what a great home it has been. The economic hardships in the Netherlands and many other European countries were severe after the war. I remember my dad explaining to me why he chose Canada for his family's new home. He had met a young Canadian soldier involved in the liberation of the Netherlands. He was impressed by the soldier and said, "If Canada has a military like that, imagine what kind of country it is." Fifty years ago we arrived in Halifax at Pier 21. That afternoon we boarded a train for Vancouver. In 1979, I moved to the Yukon and in 1988, I moved to Nova Scotia.

Thank you Canada for welcoming my family. Thank you for welcoming the millions of people from around the world looking for a new home and a new start. Our country has become a beacon of hope and light for millions of people around the world looking for a just, peaceful, and caring nation. Canada's belief in the strength of immigration has enriched our cultural heritage and helped make Canada the best country to live in.

### Seniors

I have talked with many seniors in my riding and across the country about their difficulties accessing health care, housing, and other assistance programs. Many seniors are also experiencing financial hardship. All levels of government need to pursue solutions to address the concerns of our seniors. Last June, Parliament passed a motion tabled by the NDP Seniors Critic Chris Charlton that mandates the federal government to create a Seniors Charter. The Charter recognizes older Canadians as creative, active and valued members of our society, who deserve free drug and dental coverage. The NDP motion calls on the government to create a Seniors Charter that enshrines the right of every senior in Canada to income security through protected pensions and indexed public income support, secure accessible health care including home care, pharmacare and dental care, and affordable housing. The motion also calls for the creation of an advocate or ombudsman who would publish and report annually to Parliament on government policies and programs affecting seniors. We will be pressing the federal government to implement the details of our Seniors Charter.
