Structure Fires on Increase in Beaver Bank Kinsac

For the months of March and April your Fire Dept. responded to another 23 alarms. 1 was an illegal burn, 1 alarm activated, 2 fire investigations, 3 mutual aid calls to help our neighbouring departments, 4 structure fires and 12 medical assists. This brings our totals for the year so far to 46. This is normal for this time in the year.

We have had an increase in structure fires over the past year. With this in mind I would like to remind people about fire safety. Most fires have been from human error, so please be careful when using smoking materials, candles, cooking and wood burning appliances to name a few. You as adults know what causes fires, so just take a look around and make sure yours is a fire safe home.

That's the reminder for in house, now lets talk about outside. Permits are required to burn brush. They can be purchased (for \$5.44) at the Fire Hall on Tuesday nights between 7 and 8 pm. If that's not convenient, they can be purchased at DNR in Waverly Monday thru Friday 8:30 am until 4:30 pm.

There will be and have been some of our fire personnel from town going around to different areas in HRM checking on people to see if they have permits and if they are burning safely. They could pop in at any time, so make sure you're burning properly. (They have given out tickets). When burning with permits you are not allowed to burn before 5 pm. This is because conditions are better later in the day. When you have a permit and it's raining you may call DNR in Waverly and get permission to burn before 5 pm. Campfires do not require a permit. That's campfires not bonfires.

The kids will be out of school soon so please watch out for them on their bikes and skateboards etc. Parents please make sure your children are wearing those helmets, life jackets and any other protective equipment they may need in doing their daily activities.

The civic numbers that we sell at the Fire Hall **will not** be ordered without a deposit anymore. We have had too many orders called in and not picked up. We have lost money trying to help out. So if you require a blue and white reflective sign come on down to the Fire Hall any Tues night between 7 and 8 pm to place your order.

In closing I hope you all have a great summer and please work, play and burn safely.

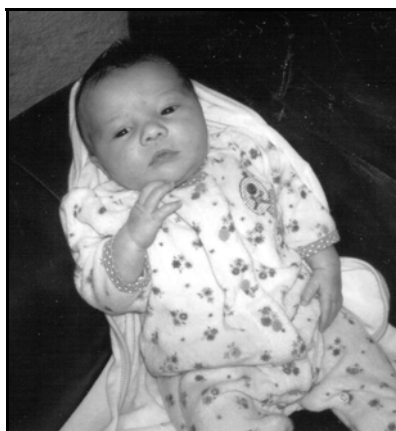
We had a fantastic time and it was great to get away from the snow and cold and enjoy some cool drinks in the sun!!

Woods House

Legislature Opens for Spring

The spring session of the Legislature is underway. The Tory budget vote passed with the Liberals voting for and the NDP voting against. This means there will be no provincial election this spring. We voted against the budget because it contains an eight per cent tax hike on electricity, and because it does little to improve care for seniors or address health-care wait times.

Until the government announces the end of this sitting of the House, my caucus colleagues and I will continue to bring forward a number of important issues and bills.

HOME CARE, ASSISTANCE FOR SENIORS NEEDED

I hear from plenty of seniors who live on fixed incomes, yet face rising costs such as higher Pharmacare fees and electricity rates. Many also worry about access to long-term care facilities or home care. The government could help by considering the ideas presented in my caucus' seniors care plan. This cost-effective plan includes a program that would allow seniors to pay someone to help with home care. It includes an assisted living allowance for low-income seniors, and day programs for frail seniors. You can find a link to the plan on my website: www.percyparis.ca.

LEGISLATION WILL PROTECT PEOPLE IN MOBILE HOME PARKS

I receive many complaints from mobile-home owners in my riding who feel frustrated when it comes to selling their homes. A growing number of mobile-home owners feel their landlords

are getting in the way of potential sales by insisting on expensive cosmetic renovations as a condition of sale.

On April 24, I introduced legislation that would amend the Residential Tenancies Act to prevent mobile-home park landlords from unreasonably or arbitrarily interfering with the sale of a mobile home. This amendment would bring more fairness to the Act, and better protect the rights of residents of mobile home parks such as Woodbine. I encourage both landlords and tenants to contact me if they would like information about their rights and responsibilities under the Residential Tenancies Act.

Other bills our caucus has introduced this spring include two bills to help reduce health-care wait times. The first bill calls for a province-wide nurse practitioner strategy. Currently, the Department of Health funds just 27 nurse practitioner positions in the province. The second calls for a pre-surgery care program to ensure patients are ready for surgery, thus resulting in fewer cancellations, reduced surgery wait times and improved recovery times for patients.

We also introduced legislation that would allow municipalities across Nova Scotia to ban the use of cosmetic pesticides, and legislation to provide interest-free loans to help people make

their homes and small businesses more energy efficient. In order to become law, these bills need to be called by the government for second and third reading.

Scouting news

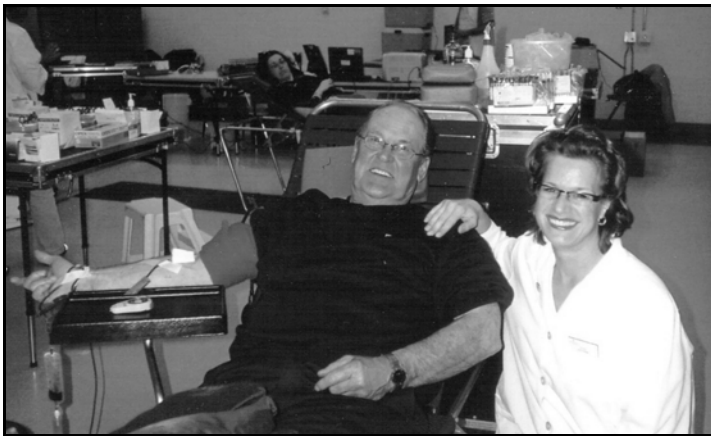
2nd Beaver Bank Scouting held its annual Group Camp at the end

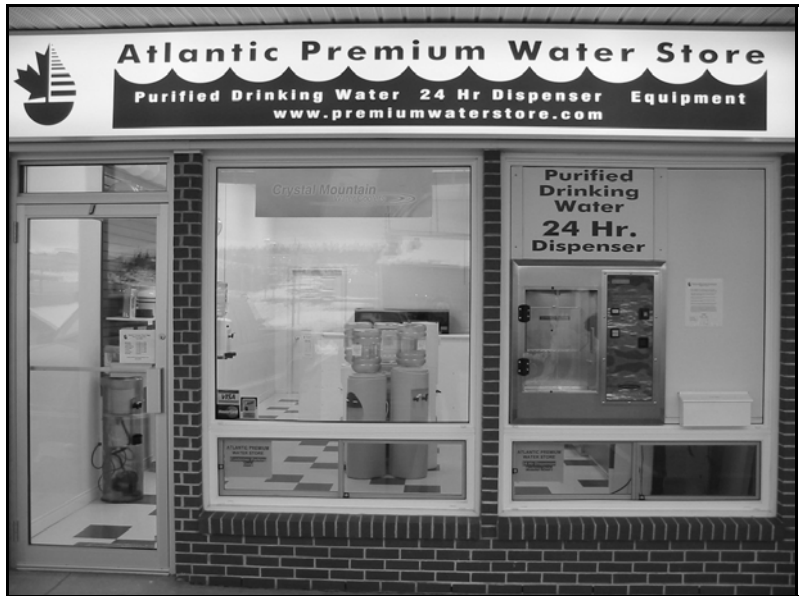

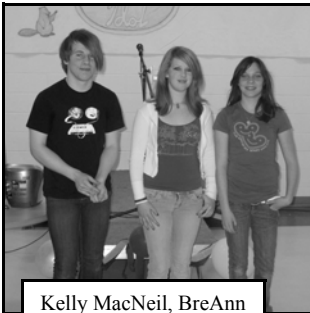

Our adult winner was Rose-Mary Buote.

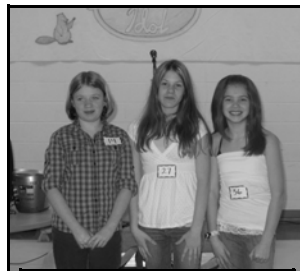
