Make Your Holiday a Fire Safe One!

For the months of Sept and Oct your fire department has responded to 21 alarms, they consisted of: 1 fire investigation, 1 illegal burn, 1 structure fire, 3 alarms activated, 5 MVA's and 10 medical assists. This brings our total for the year so far to 115; we will be up for the year if this trend continues.

The heating season is well underway and for the wood burning people we need to make sure that when we clean out those ashes from the wood stove that we dispose of them properly. Recently there was a fire, not in our area, where someone disposed of their ashes in their green bin thinking they were all out. The green bin was stored under their deck. Well, I don't have to tell you anymore of that story except they won't be in their home for Xmas. The wood stove ashes should be store in a metal can with a cover somewhere away from the house and disposed of when you are sure they are no longer hot. Ashes can stay hot for many days, so don't be fooled. While we are on the topic of green bins, in past few years there have been a number of reports of fire caused by green bins. Depending on what has been thrown in them, there is the risk of spontaneous combustion happening. So... if you store these bins up against the house, garage or shed you may have a fire starting from the outside in. So in saying this, please store your green bins away from any combustibles.

For those who missed the last Bulletin, you are allowed to burn brush now without a permit till April 15. Please make sure you burn safely. All your batteries in your smoke detectors should have been changed when the time was turned back and changed again in the spring when the clocks go ahead. This is a great way to remember to do it.

The Holiday Season will soon be here, please remember to check those lights and cords before using them. Make sure the placement of the Xmas tree is done so that it won't cause any safety issues such as causing a fire or blocking escape routes.

In closing please drive to the conditions, make sure your civic number is displayed so we can see it clearly from the road, be sure your smoke detectors all work, and please make sure the ice is safe before you venture out on it.

SCHOOLS NEED A SAFE, CONSISTENT DIABETES STRATEGY

Children with Type 1 diabetes face challenging and stressful lives. Their schools need a safe, consistent diabetes strategy. Kids with diabetes need individual care plans, clean places to test their blood, and emergency supplies with people on hand trained to use them.

Late this summer, the Canadian Diabetes Association released a draft Act that any province could adopt, to protect students with life-threatening

illnesses like diabetes, asthma, severe allergies, and epilepsy. The CDA sent it to the Health and Education Ministers of every province and territory. The CDA's Nova Scotia branch says the only response they've gotten from our government was an acknowledgement that the letter was received.

New Brunswick also has an excellent, practical protocol in place for the safety of all students. New Brunswick's model is proof that Nova Scotia doesn't have to spend months and years on this issue. It is my hope the government will work with these existing models and quickly implement a safe, consistent diabetes strategy for Nova Scotia's schools.

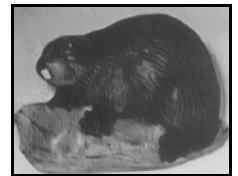
